47J Board agrees to video surveillance

The Vernonia School Board of Directors held a Special Meeting on April 23. After an executive session held to negotiate real property transactions, the Board voted unanimously to authorize Superintendent Ken Cox to negotiate real property transactions as outlined in the executive session.

The Board also approved the first reading of Policy ECAC on Video Surveillance. ECAC

authorizes the use of video cameras on district property to "ensure the health, welfare and safety of all staff, students and visitors to district property, and to safeguard district facilities and equipment." A statement in the policy says, "Video recordings may become a part of a student's educational record or a staff member's personnel record."

The Board held a workshop

on April 30 to hear a presentation by Carol Samuels of Seattle NW Securities on bond measures. This was for informational purposes only. The board will be addressing the bond issue at future meetings.

The next regularly scheduled board meeting will be May 14, at 6:00 p.m. at the District Office.

Two weeks ago, a group of students and staff had the opportunity to visit four different schools that were designed by BOORA Architects in recent years. We were able to see first-hand the innovations and design elements they used to make those schools highly sustainable, as well as being effective learning environments.

Last Tuesday, we had a Town Hall Meeting to review these and other design options for our new schools. We hope to have some of the Power Point presentations shared at that meeting available on the website (www.vernonia.k12. or.us) soon.

The big question that is out there is what is this going to cost? In our work with BOORA we have compressed their normal 4-6 month design development process into just over two months. The current plan is to have a concept design and more accurate cost estimate by the end of June.

But what is it going to cost me as a taxpayer, you ask. Well, we have the beginning of an answer. The board appointed a committee to discuss what would be a realistic bond amount and they recommended \$13 million.

The school board met last week at a workshop to review the committee's recommendation and gather more information from a bonding company on the cost per thousand (tax assessed value) and financing of such a bond. The remainder of the cost for the new schools will come from stimulus funds, grants and fundraising efforts by the Oregon Solutions Team. The bottom line is – we will get \$45 million dollars worth of safe, sustainable schools for our \$13 million investment in a bond.

Our schools are the heart of our community! We need your input in knowing what you want your schools to look like and how they can support our community as a whole. 
