Ike Says...

Well, there are winners and losers; seems this year a whole lot more people lost in the tag draw, but I have a big grin on my face. I finally drew an antelope tag again – it took only 13 years to get it done. I don't seem to have the lucky touch like one of

my best friends, but hey, I will take this antelope tag!

With an antelope tag in my wallet, it is time to get busy brushing up on my long range shooting skills. I used to shoot longer distances all the time, especially when I traveled to Wyoming to go deer and antelope hunting. It wasn't rare to find my friends and me practicing our skills out to 500 yards. I remember being pretty cocky about my shooting skills, then missing a Doe antelope in Wyoming at 100 yards. Never did figure out what I did wrong on that! The rest of the trip ended with great results, but missing that Doe still haunts me.

I have used the same load in my .270 for decades and have never had a problem, but this year I have decided to step up to a new bullet, which is supposed to be a better choice. Along with using a new bullet comes new load development, something that most people don't understand. Rifles can be finicky and a person who

hand loads their own ammo goes through a ritual of varying the powder charge and bullet seating depth. The combinations can be endless and it is easy to end up throwing your hands into the air in frustration. Luckily, my change to this new bullet has ended happily and now it is time to brush up my long range shooting.

Some may wonder why a person needs to shoot long distances when, in most instances, shots are less than 200 yards. Antelope, though, can stretch the shot distance; they have excellent vision and the terrain they inhabit is open and flat, which makes stalking within short distances challenging. This is why developing the skills to shoot longer ranges enhances a sportsan's chances of bagging a trophy antelope. But hunters must recognize their skill level and never take a shot that they cannot consistently make; we owe that to the animals we pursue.

It is not enough to sit at a bench and a rock steady rest and punch tight groups; in hunting there are no benches or steady rests. Many sportsmen don't take the time to practice shooting off hand (close shots only) or get used to shooting prone or sitting. My choice for long distance shooting is sitting with a bipod rest; it is amazing how steady a person can get in this position. But it takes many rounds of ammunition to gain the skill necessary to make the long shots consistently.
