Vernonia Cares help fill stomachs

Vernonia Cares Food Bank (VCFB) is available to help local families with emergency groceries. "Many people forget about our assistance, which is available to help during these difficult times," said VCFB Director Sandy Welch. "After the flood of 2007. Vernonia Cares Food Bank was released from the income eligibility guidelines in order to serve our community in a wider capacity with emergency groceries. Not that we've fully recovered from that event, but it seems time to restore the guidelines to provide groceries to those for whom the Oregon Food Bank and USDA services are intended. However, the guidelines are very generous and many local people may benefit from grocery help from VCFB," Welch emphasized.

The food bank is located at 627 Adams Avenue (in the American Legion Building) and is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. It offers approximately three days worth of groceries. Recipients are eligible to receive groceries once a month. Bread products are available once a week, thanks to donations from Safeway of Forest Grove. Currently VCFB helps 300-400 people per month.

New clients will be asked to complete a simple registration interview, show proof of residency within the Vernonia, Timber or Buxton area and verify that they are within the above listed income guidelines. The verification must include gross income from all sources for all household members.

Current clients will be asked, as of June 1. to verify their income by signing a document to that effect. Vernonia Cares Food Bank does not discriminate as to race, sex, national origin, political affiliation, familial status, age, disability, religion, military status, marital status, or sexual orientation/gender identity.

"Thanks to the generosity of donors, Vernonia Cares Food Bank continues to help those who may be hungry and living within our community," said Welch. "Nearly one-half of our clients are children or senior citizens. Almost everyone has been short of funds in their lifetime and the food budget is the place where money is transferred in order to pay a more urgent bill. Donors recognize all this and wish to help. Food is a necessity of life and it's one of the most direct and easiest items to supply to those who need it. Donations of food or funds are appreciated. The Letter Carriers Food Drive is an example of people being a part of the answer," she concluded.
