On the shelf:

The Art of Devotion by Samantha Bruce-Benjamin. In this debut novel, the dark side of human nature is revealed as four women share a tale of love, obsession and betrayal that binds them forever. It starts when Adora loses her older brother, whom she had loved exclusively. Years later, she fills the gap he left with another couple's daughter, Genevieve. At first, Genevieve is thrilled to be included in the older woman's life, but gradually she realizes she is caught in a web of lies and illusion.

Whiter Than Snow by Sandra Dallas. Swandyke, a small town in the mountains of Colorado, is changed forever in 1920 when an avalanche rips through the town, enveloping everything in its path. The tragedy touches the lives of many of the residents, bringing out secrets that had been hidden. Fate and chance collide in the lives of these people, showing that no one is without sin and no one is without the need for forgive-

ness. Dallas' thoroughly American voice and attention to historical detail resonates with the resilience of the human spirit in her newest novel.

The Cabal by David Hagberg. Hagberg, a former Air Force cryptographer, brings us

this novel of political intrigue. CIA operative Todd Van Buren meets with an investigative re-

porter who has uncovered strong evidence that a lobbyist has formed a powerful group called the Friday club. Its members include high-ranking men inside the government. The reporter fears the club is powerful enough to topple the government. Then the reporter and his family are killed and Van Buren is gunned down and all traces of the club are erased. Kirk Mc-Garvey, legendary spy and father-in-law to Van Buren, is soon drawn into the most dangerous investigation of his career, the stakes of which could destabilize the U.S. government and shake the world.

Fall of Giants by Ken Follett. Follett is writing a trilogy that will chronicle the dramatic events of the twentieth century. This novel, the first of the trilogy, follows five interrelated families from five different countries through World War I, the Russian Revolution and the struggle for women's suffrage. The novel moves from Washington, D.C., to St. Petersburg, and from the grit and danger of a coal mine to the glamour of a palace. Follett brings the century alive and shows historical events through the passion of the people who lived


