School board accepts new grant funds

Jarman tells the good and the bad of 2010 fall sports season

The 2010 fall sports seasons saw the Loggers meeting new competition in a new league for football and volleyball. In cross country we were in the same special district as in previous years, competing against 1-A, 2-A and 3-A schools. With the new league, the volleyball team stepped up to the net and earned themselves a shot at the league play-offs. The football team remained winless, however they were much improved over last season and showed it in most games. The cross country team did not qualify any runners for the state meet, but did have one boy finish ahead of all Rainier runners, who qualified as a team for the state meet. A new format, put out by the OSAA this year, meant to conserve money for various school districts did not bode well for the Vernonia runner and he did not qualify this year where in years past he would have.

In cross country we had approximately 18 boy and girl athletes finish the season. With All

League honors going to Nathan Fleck, as a second team selection, and Honorable Mention All League going to Rowan Cheney. We were a few athletes short of having a full team for the girls side, but the boys had a full team until about halfway through the year, when we lost one of our athletes to injury. Both boys and girls teams trained and strived hard and, under the direction of first year head coach Byron Brown, with only a few seniors on the team and both of the all-league athletes returning next year, the outlook for cross country looks good.

Second year coach Brad Baker is still looking for his first win as head coach of the Loggers football program. A turn out of under thirty mostly younger or inexperienced athletes hurt the Loggers chances of coming up with their first victory. We had only nine seniors and four of them were foreign exchange students who had never played organized football before. We started the season with 27 athletes and ended the season with 25. Injuries played a big part in the lack of success this year. An example of this can be seen by the fact that our two top running backs were iniured for the majority of the season. Additionally, having one or two key linemen out of one game or another makes it very difficult to come up with wins. In spite of the winless year three of our athletes still earned all league honors. Junior Joe Benes, senior Alex Barber and foreign exchange student Daniel Delarosa were all named second team All League athletes. The team was also awarded the Sportsmanship Award when the league meeting was held last month, which was a positive end to the sea-

Volleyball was the highlight of the fall sports season. With 21 girls starting the season and ending with 20, the girls were a force to contend with in the Northwest League. For the first time in several years, the girls made it to the league play-offs. This was not an easy task, being down 2 games to none in a play-in game held at Banks High School, our girls came back to win the next three games and advance to a play-

off game at Knappa. With just three seniors graduating and a returning all league player, the Lady Loggers look forward to the challenges of the Northwest League next year. Sarah McMahon and Ariel Rock were All League selections for the Loggers this year. With Sarah returning and some talented athletes surrounding her, the

girls will look to improve their third place finish in league and perhaps host a league play-off game for the coming season. There are plans to hold a camp/clinic for younger players next year to try and get the younger girls more experience and knowledge in the game of volleyball.
