Miss Rodeo Oregon will travel over 30,000 miles this year promoting the sport of rodeo and representing the State of Oregon at PRCA rodeos, parades, fundraisers, school visits, other rodeo court coronations and pageants, the Columbia River Circuit Finals and, at the end of the year, the Miss Rodeo America Pageant held in conjunction with the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Mackenzie Carr is the daughter of Alan and Barb Carr of Vernonia, Oregon. She grew up on a small farm in a rural timber community an hour from the Oregon coast. Mackenzie is a 2008 graduate and Valedictorian of Vernonia High School, as well as a nine year member of Columbia County Horse 4-H. Her involvement with the Columbia County Fair and Rodeo continued as Carr served as a 2007 Columbia County Fair and Rodeo Princess, and Queen in 2008. In 2009, she went on to represent the Northwest Professional Rodeo Association as Miss NPRA. In July 2010. Mackenzie was awarded the prestigious title of Miss Rodeo Oregon. In addition to

winning the title, she earned the awards for Appearance. Speech, Knowledge, Horsemanship, Personality, and Photogenic. In her spare time she enjoys riding her horses, giving riding lessons to children, and spending time in the great outdoors. Mackenzie attended Oregon State University for two years studying Civil Engineering, and will continue working toward an Architectural degree, with a minor in Speech Communications.
