Mrs. Alvira Knowles died at her home in Silvertown, Tuesday, February 10, at 5:20 a. m.

Alvira J. Hibbard was born December 4, 1843. She came across the plains with her parents and an older brother and sister, in 1847. She was married to John Knowles in 1864, at the old Hibbard home in the Waldo Hills.

For many years they lived near Hubbard, Oregon, but afterward moved to their home one mile west of Silvertown. Her husband, John Knowles, died in 1906. Mrs. Knowles has lived much of the time since with her brothers, Trenton Hibbard, who died in 1910, and George Hibbard, who survives to mourn their loss.

Another brother who survives this pioneer sister, is Charles Hibbard, of Los Angeles. Her son, Charles Knowles, of Lincoln county, Oregon, and her daughter, Mrs. Alvis Russell, of Molalla, Oregon, and other relatives and many friends join in sorrow for another kind and loving woman gone to her rest.

The funeral was held Thursday at the home of George Hibbard in this city.

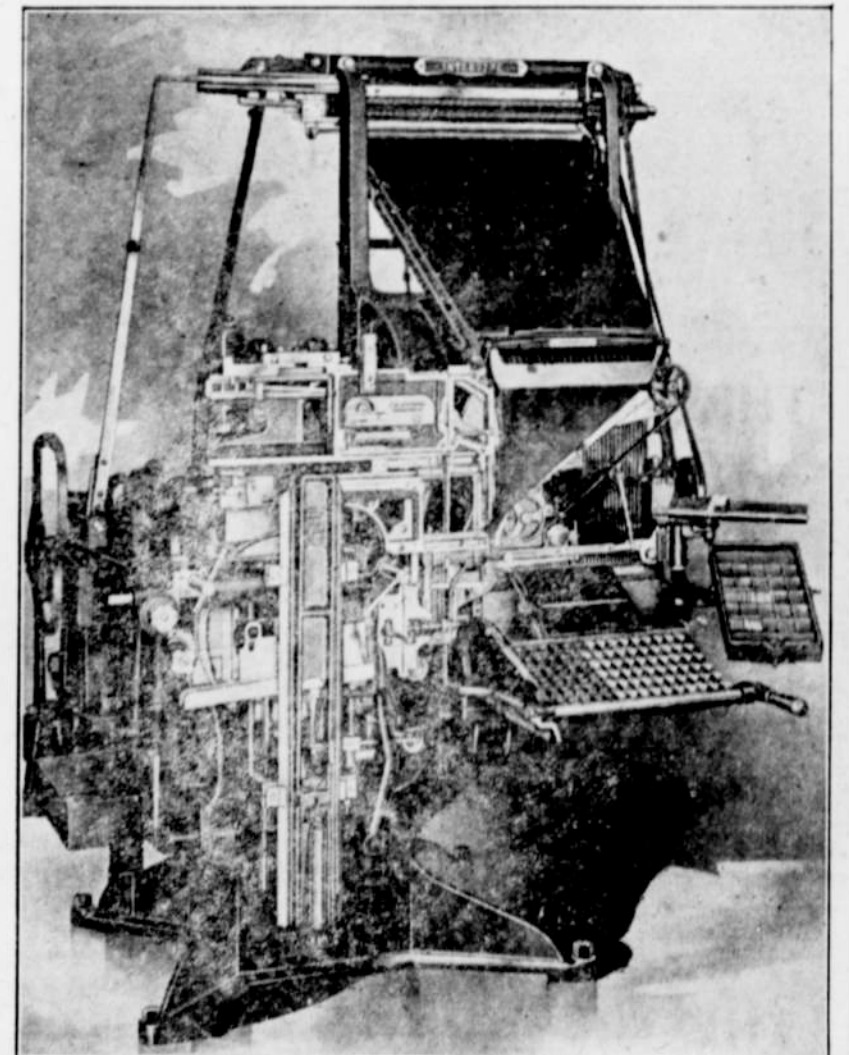
