WHO ASSASSINATED ABRAHAM LINCOLN?

When Abraham Lincoln with his splendid administration of affairs, at the most critical time of the great rebellion, was winning out, the pope of Rome was planning the defeat of the Union forces and aiding and acknowledging the government of the south-



ern confederacy. Not only this, but according to Father Chiniquy, he planned and accomplished the murder of Lincoln himself. Father Chiniquy had learned from another ex-priest that there was a plot to kill Lincoln and in August obtained an interview with the president.

In that interview Lincoln said: "I want your views about a thing which is exceedingly puzzling to me, and you are the only one to whom I like to speak on that subject. A great number of Democratic papers have been sent to me, lately, evidently written by Roman Catholics, publishing that I was born a Roman Catholic, and baptized by a priest. They call me a renegade, an apostate, on account of that; and they heap upon my head mountains of abuse. At first, I laughed at that, for it is a lie. Thanks be to God, I have never been a Roman Catholic. No priest of Rome has ever laid his hand on my head. But the persistency of the Romish press to present this falsehood to their readers as a gospel truth, must have a meaning. Please tell me, as briefly as possible what you think about it."

"My dear president," I answered, "it was just this strange story published about you, which brought me here yesterday. I wanted to say a word about it; but you were too busy. "Let me tell you that I wept as a child when I read that story for the first time, but I have from the lips of a converted priest, that it is in order to excite the fanaticism of the Roman Catholic murders, whom they hope to find, sooner or later, to strike you down, they have invented that false story of your being born in the church of Rome, and of your being baptized by a priest. They want that to brand your face with the ignominious mark of apostasy. Do not forget that, in the church of Rome, an apostate is an outcast, who has no place in society, and who has no right to live."

"The Jesuits want the Roman Catholics to believe that you are a monster, an open enemy of God and of his church, that you are an ex-communicated man. For every apostate is, ipse facto (by that very fact) ex-communicated. I have brought to you the theology of one of the most learned and approved of the Jesuits of his time, Bussambaum, who, with many others, say that the man who will kill you will do a good and holy work. More than that, here is a copy of a decree of Gregory VII., proclaiming that the killing of an apostate, or an heretic and an ex-communicated man, as you are declared to be, is not murder; nay, that it is good, a Christian action. That decree is incorporated in the canon law, which every priest must study, and which every good Catholic must follow."

"My dear president, I must repeat to you here what I said when in Urbana, in 1856. My fear is that you will fall under the blows of a Jesuit assassin, if you do not pay more attention than you have done, till now, to protect yourself. Remember that because Coligny was an heretic, as you are, he was brutally murdered in the St. Bartholomew night; that Henry IV was stabbed by the Jesuit assassin, Revailiac, the 14th of May, 1610, for having given liberty of conscience to his people, and that William the Taciturn, was shot dead by another Jesuit murderer, called Girard, for having broken the yoke of the pope. The church of Rome is absolutely the same today as she was then; she does believe and teach, today, as then, that she has the right and that it is her duty to punish by death any heretic who is in her way as an obstacle to her designs. The unanimity with which the Catholic hierarchy of the United States is on the side of the rebels, is an incontrovertible evidence that Rome wants to destroy this republic, and as you are, by your personal virtues, your popularity, your love for liberty, your position, the greatest obstacle to their diabolical scheme, their hatred is concentrated upon you; you are the daily object of their maledictions; it is at your breast they will direct their blows. My blood chills in my veins, when I contemplate the day which may come, sooner or later, when Rome will add to all her other iniquities, the murder of Abraham Lincoln."

The whole account as given in Father Chiniquy's book, "Fifty years in the Church of Rome," should be read by every citizen of America. The officials at Washington were afraid to look into the matter closely for fear of another bloody war between the Catholics and Protestants, and they were very anxious to have peace at almost any cost. But the rest of the story should now be known; how one of the murderers was protected by priests in the service of the bishop and smuggled off to Europe, and finally taken from the service of the pope by the United States government and tried, but how by getting Catholics on the jury, the church saved their murder tool. The whole story will never be known, but there is enough known to brand the hierarchy with the foulest names in the English language—traitor and assassin.

THE SAN FRANCISCO FAIR.

What the World is Planning at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

The rarest fabrics produced in China will be exhibited at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. Dr. T. C. Chu, counselor of the ministry of industry and commerce of China, and special commissioner to the exposition, announces that the Chinese architect who is to design the Chinese pavilion, will reach San Francisco soon. China will expend \$800,000 on its display, says Dr. Chu. The exhibit will be concerned principally with the liberal arts, manufactures, and agricultural pursuits of the republic.

At the close of the exposition, the pavilion, which will be of permanent construction, will be presented to the American people.

Radium, the rarest and costliest of all minerals, the curative and energizing powers of which are holding the attention of the scientific world, will be one of the most important exhibits at the exposition. The intrinsic value of material shown at the exhibit will reach a fabulous sum. German exhibitors have promised to send a display of radium and radium ores.

The Panama-Pacific International exposition has made an agreement with the Parseval Company of Hamburg, Germany, to operate a Parseval dirigible at the exposition.

The dirigible will be the largest ever constructed, having a length of 450 feet and a width of 80 feet, and will cost \$250,000. The hangar, or house in which it will be kept when on exhibition, will be portable, constructed in Germany at a cost of \$60,000. A gas plant will be built costing \$40,000. The gigantic air-ship will make trips of fifty miles length, carrying passengers at \$25 each. Two licensed crews of eight members each, from Germany, will accompany the dirigible to America and operate it while at San Francisco.

When not making regular trips the Parseval will be on exhibition at the hangar. Here exposition visitors will have an opportunity to explore its spacious interior, comprised of observation rooms, sleeping rooms, diner, kitchen, bath, smoking room, reading room and all accessories that provide a modern transportation car with the comforts of travel.

A model of the Panama canal, 500 feet in length, will be among the exhibits by the United States government at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. Of the \$500,000 appropriated by congress for federal exhibits, \$60,000 has been turned over to the Isthmian Canal commission for the construction of the model. The model, complete in all working details, will allow the passage of toy boats. It will be built to scale.

The first round-the-world air flight is planned to start from the ground of the Panama-Pacific International exposition in May, 1915. Airmen from all the nations of civilization, in aircraft of every type, will contend for the largest prize fund ever offered in any sporting event in history—\$300,000 will be distributed among the victors. The route will pass eastward across the American continent, the Atlantic, Europe, Asia, and the Pacific ocean to Alaska, thence the flyers will proceed to San Francisco.

A time limit of 90 days is placed upon the contest, which will have the sanction of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale, the central organization of aeronautical bodies in every civilized country on the globe.
