INDUSTRIAL REVIEW OF THE STATE.

Progress of Industries and Manufacturing, Development Enterprises That Provide Oregon People With Payrolls.

(Compiled by State Bureau of Industries and Statistics.)

On Wednesday of this week bids were received by the State Highway Engineer for construction of the Columbia hard surface highway through Clatsop county.

The Brownville cannery has placed orders for 20,000 crates to hold its pack with Rorer Bros. Planing Mills at Albany.

A large dock is to be built at Port Orford by the Macleay interests of Portland.

The Riverton mines on the Coquille have contracted for delivery of 2000 tons of coal to railroad contractors on the Siuslaw.

Albany has funds completed for a \$25,000 library building.

The Pacific Pressed Face brick plant at Willamina has resumed operation, employing 75 men.

Coos county will erect a \$25,000 exhibit building and display at the Panama Exposition.

Vida, Lane County, will erect a \$3000 school house.

The hop crop in the Willamette Valley promises to yield a bumper crop of 160,000 bales or over this year.

Oregon's strict eugenic marriage law has increased fees received in Clarke county, Vancouver, Wash., to \$10,038 for 1913.

Portland men are investigating the prospect for a fruit and vegetable cannery in Baker County.

Railroad officials visit various sections of the state asking extensions but it is understood that there will be no work undertaken except that provided for on the Willamette-Pacific line to Coos Bay.

Portland will use 200,000 pounds of pig led this year in lay water mains.

A large flouring mill is being built at Cove, Union county, to take the place of one burned last year.

A large warehouse is being built at Nelson's siding in Baker Co.

Forest Grove Cannery is adding a fine warehouse addition.

F. L. Chambers will erect a factory building for the Eugene mattress and rug industry.

Springfield has a greenhouse industry with almost an acre under glass.

Geo. Young of La Grande is installing machinery and enlarging his candy factory.

Friday a party of 25 Agricultural College Students and Professors spent the day visiting the principal Salem factories.

Merford is undertaking the construction of a \$50,000 Elks temple. Congressman Sinnott has secured \$60,000 additional for the Pendleton postoffice.

Hood River pays \$18,000 a year city taxes for 2000 population, and it costs \$200,000 a year for 8000 people of Hood River county.

Flavel has been chosen for docks for the Hill terminals and yardage will be constructed to hold 1000 cars.

Wheeler is to have dockage facilities to transfer water freights.

Three churches are to unite in building a large college at Philomath.

Local capital is developing a large meat packing plant at Springfield.

Milton and Freewater are to get new libraries.

W. H. Lucke of Canby will build a warehouse at Oregon City.

SCHOOL CHILDREN TO OBSERVE GOOD ROADS DAY.

Portland, Ore., April 21 (Special) In connection with the efforts of the grown-ups to improve the condition of Oregon roads on Saturday, April 25th, it has been suggested that all the school children of the state be requested to turn out and assist in the good work. As there are about 190,000 school children in the state, it has been estimated that each will be able to remove at least 100 loose rocks from the road nearest their home, it will be equal in value to the efforts of a thousand men and will remove 1,900,000 obstructions from the roads of the state.

The suggestion is also made that the good women of each district throughout the state serve road lunches or a hot dinner at the grange, schoolhouse or other local meeting place to actual workers only. No workee, no eattee.

Four out of the committee of five, appointed to investigate the school site proposition, handed in a report yesterday afternoon. The committee reported on seven locations as follows: John Koleon's 7-10 acre tract on Koons St.; Rebecca Mount's 1 and 3-4 acre tract on Welch St.; \$2500; Sam Ames' 2 acre tract on East Hill, \$4000; Adolph Wolf's 2 acre tract, University Property, \$4500; J. M. Brown's 3 and 1-2 acre tract between the Geiser Addition and the R. R. track, \$5000; W. H. Trullinger lots, on First and "A" Sts., \$1900; M. Small one acre tract on McClaine St., \$600.

The four reporting members of the committee recommend the Trullinger property and give four reasons for their recommendation as follows: 1. Economy of operation: the janitor who takes care of the High School building can also look after this work. 2. Better superintendence: by locating the new building at this place, no time will be lost by the Superintendent between buildings. 3. This site already has water and sewer and is the only one which is thus provided; all other sites would entail considerable expense in this direction. 4. Central location: This site in our estimation is most easily reached from all parts of the district.
