### MODERN IMPROVED METHODS OF ROBBERY.

Then the robber buys a newspaper or carries it with greenbacks, and has himself entitled a "Napoleon of Finance", while the rudimentary undeveloped aggressor or speculative survival of more primitive times who steals a bag of flour instead of a grain crop, or takes a few hundreds instead of a million, has to put up with the old time uncivilized name of "thief".

Imprisonment for debt has been abolished, and also imprisonment for theft—if it is committed according to the law and by methods approved by the particular variety of the Napoleon having control of the government.
