The following editorial from the Los Angeles Times was recently repeated in the Catholic Sentinel. We print it as the Sentinel had it, heading and all:

BIGOTRY DENOUNCED

"In an editorial entitled 'The Voice of Socialism' the Los Angeles Times says:

An old enemy under a new name is making its noisome presence known throughout the country. For years a publication issued at Girard, Kan., under the misnomer of 'The Appeal to Reason,' ranted at all opponents of Socialism. Revelation of graft, hypocrisy and insincerity on the part of the management effectively crumpled the paper and though it is not dead, its influence has been nullified. But the cold-blooded, money-making capital out of venomous attacks on established institutions, and under a different guise lent its support to 'The Menace,' a weekly published at Aurora, Mo., the avowed purpose of which is to do as much harm as possible, with the use of whatever misrepresentations and lies seem suitable, to the Catholic Church.

The reason for its animus is transparent. The Catholic Church is one of the most influential and substantial opponents of Socialism in the world. If the authority of the Catholic Church were crushed the Socialists would find many avenues opened that are now closed to their proselyters. The Church is fundamentally opposed to the principles of Socialism, and the whole of its powerful organization has been put into operation to check and drive back the disciples of Marx and Engels.

The Socialists have long been furious at this masterful opposition, and they have been helpless against it. But 'The Menace' came to lead a flank attack on the Church. That paper has made an effort to conceal its Socialist affiliation, but authoritative information from the 'inner circle' reveals that the leading lights of 'The Appeal to Reason' are aiding 'The Menace'—but keeping themselves under a bushel, as it were.

'The Menace' publishes anything regardless of truth, that directly or indirectly may reflect discredit on the Catholic Church. The testimony of defrocked priests is given circulation; the wildest stories are told in the yellowest language—as for instance that the Knights of Columbus are a Catholic militia, armed, drilled and ready to attempt to seize the United States any time the Pope issues order. What rot! 'The Menace' charges that the Catholic Church dominates the Federal Government, that the purpose of the Church is to ultimately seize and destroy the United States, and intimates that all Protestants will be converted or burned.

The Socialists are making the same sort of attack against the Church as they make against all who oppose them. In every political campaign it is seen that they make any charges irrespective of any truth, that will seem to discredit their opponents. And in this campaign the vileness of their charges is restrained only by the postal laws, for everything vicious that can be sent through the mails has been and is being published. 'The Menace,' knowing the class to which it caters is concerned with sensations and not with facts, never takes the trouble to verify or prove any of its statements. Any ex-communicated Catholic, any priest who has been sent from the Church, anybody who has a wild tale to tell is immediately accepted as indubitable authority and put forward as a competent witness to impeach the Roman Catholic Church, Pope, Cardinals, Bishops, priests, convents and laymen."

This article proves beyond a doubt that the Los Angeles Times is managed, as most of the big dailies are, by Jesuit interests. There is no doubt that the down trodden sometimes act wild and rude when they get to the point of striking back at society and the many enemies of mankind under various names, but the main question is not one of calling names, nor does it matter much if the Appeal to Reason and The Menace are partners in destroying capitalism and Catholicism. What people want to know is whether capitalism and its partner, Catholicism, is right or is the highest ideal of democracy, some call Socialism, right.

The Times says that "the Church is fundamentally opposed to the principles of Socialism, and we agree that that is the exact fact. Now which is right? We know that The Menace does not publish anything regardless of truth and boldly assert that The Times has knowingly and maliciously lied, and more than this, we are absolutely certain that the whole Catholic doctrine, scheme and practice, is one of the most colossal lies that was ever forced onto suffering humanity.

The fight is on. It is for the mastery of the world. Who will win, the old enemy of entranced ecclesiasticism and the king (money) or the people? Verily, history is rapidly in the making. There can be no compromise. It is the most gigantic war of the ages. The Silverton Journal is a free press. It is on the side of the people. SILVERTON TELEPHONE RATES

Salem, Ore., Aug. 7. — Silverton telephone rates will be taken up by the state railroad commission at a hearing to be held at the city hall in Silverton on August 12, at 9 o'clock a. m. The Interurban Telephone Company recently applied for authority to increase its charges, and all persons interested in these rates are invited to appear at the time named.

The company in its application asserts that increase is urgently needed because of increased expenses. It is stated that additional pay required for exchange operators under order of the state industrial commission will require approximately \$900 a year, and it is declared necessary to increase the salary of the manager and of the linemen to secure efficient and proper operation. It is estimated that the increases asked for will amount to a little more than \$1,000 a year, or about 5½ per cent on the investment.

The company desires to increase its rates in Silverton 25 cents a month on each class of service, also 10 cents a month on extension phones without bell attachment, and \$1 for every six months on farmer lines where the telephone and equipment is owned by the subscriber. It is proposed to create a new eight-party suburban service for \$4 a quarter, with a rebate of 25 cents for prompt payment.

No change is proposed in the toll line rates.

OUTCRY FROM SALOON VICTIMS

Out of a total of 1478 prisoners confined in the Eastern Penitentiary of Pennsylvania, 1008 have signed a petition which will be submitted to the next legislature asking statewide prohibition.

The petition is probably the strongest sociological argument ever made against the liquor traffic. Without a word or even a suggestion from Warden McKenty, the prisoners confined signed their names and in many instances volunteered to go before a legislative committee and tell how the saloon has wrecked their lives.

Three months ago the Empire, the little paper published by the convicts, started a crusade against the saloon. Letters began to flow in telling the personal stories of prisoners who claimed that were it not for whiskey they would not be serving time in prison.

The editor of the paper, himself a prisoner, was so impressed with the letters that he drafted a petition and sent it around the prison for signatures.

These men are victims of the saloon-traps set by the state to trip up the unwary and wreck their homes and families. The statewide dry movement is based on the principle that this policy is wrong and that the time has come to quit it.
