OREGON SHOULD RAISE MORE FLAX

Portland, Ore., Nov. 10, (Special). One of the industries in Oregon which has an opportunity to make a special growth at this time, owing to war conditions in Europe, is the flax industry. Dr. E. A. Pierce, chairman of the Oregon flax committee, has recently written to the promotion department of the Portland Commercial Club inviting its participation in this movement. He calls attention to the fact that the known flax producing area of the world is comparatively small; that under present conditions it is unlikely that any considerable amount of flax will be raised in Belgium, Ireland or Russia and that it will devolve upon the United States to furnish the greater part of the fiber needed within the next few years. It is well known that the Willamette Valley and other parts of Oregon can produce flax fiber equal to the best European product and he believes that this is Oregon's opportunity to attract the attention of the world by her flax production. In the vicinity of Salem it has been demonstrated that one acre of flax will produce from 500 to 600 pounds of clean fiber which at present prices should make this crop as profitable as anything the farmers can raise.

Within the last few days steps have been taken to build an electric line between Astoria and Seaside. It is believed that the necessary right of way can be secured practically without cost and that work on the line will be commenced within a short time.

Work has been commenced on a canning plant at Houlton. The last few years has seen such a remarkable increase in the output of fruits and vegetables in that territory that some means of taking care of the surplus has become imperative.

The First National Bank of Canby opened its doors for the first time last week. The bank is financed by officials of the Canby State Bank and other residents of Clackamas County.

J. B. Eaton, a cattle buyer from Texas, has been visiting various portions of the Willamette Valley, recently buying cattle for shipment to Texas. Shipments of butter to Chicago and cattle to Texas would indicate that Oregon's position as a dairy country is becoming well established.

The milk condensery at Newberg has resumed operations after having been temporarily closed on account of fire. It is taking all the milk from about 1000 cows, sending its wagons into the country for a distance of ten miles. It disburses an average of \$5000 per month to the farmers and dairymen.

THIRTEEN DEAD FROM DRINKING WOOD ALCOHOL AT BRISTOL, VERMONT

As a result of drinking wood alcohol, procured at Bisbee's Drug store, 13 men have died this week. The liquor was obtained Friday and Saturday of last week.

Bristol has passed through many exciting periods, but this one overshadows all that preceded. Sorrow and weeping prevails where but a few days ago there was life and happiness. The lesson taught by this week's events can be studied by each resident of the town and they can do as they see fit about profiting by the same.

State's attorney F. W. Tuttle of Vergennes was summoned and, after his arrival, Bisbee was arrested and placed in the village lockup.

Rumors of all kinds were afloat Sunday and Monday and a bitter feeling was evidenced against Bisbee. Late Monday afternoon the officers took Bisbee to Middlebury and placed him in the county jail.

While the people were surprised at the three deaths Sunday they were shocked Monday when death after death was reported until a total of nine was reached, making a grand total of twelve for the two days.

Dr. Stone of the state laboratory, Burlington, was summoned. Dr. Whitney came with him and, with local physicians, held an autopsy in each case. The result has not been made public, but the finding in each case was similar. These doctors visited here again Tuesday and held autopsies in the other cases.

We do not know what the charge, other than that of selling and keeping with intent to sell, against Bisbee will be.

Bisbee made a statement Tuesday at Middlebury in which he referred to the unfortunate victims as follows: "They had confidence in me when they made the purchase. They died thinking that 'Doc' had made a mistake. This is terrible." It can be truthfully stated that Bisbee's patrons were loyal to him in all respects.

In his statement Bisbee divulged some interesting facts. He admitted receiving shipments from and doing business with the Troy concern for thirty years during which time he paid the firm \$100,000. The reader can estimate the profit Bisbee has made. Continuing he said: "Ten gallons of what I sold was shipped to me by the company on Friday. I have the labels and express receipts marked 'Cologne Spirits.'" He admits having sold about four gallons of the stuff in pint bottles at 60c per bottle.

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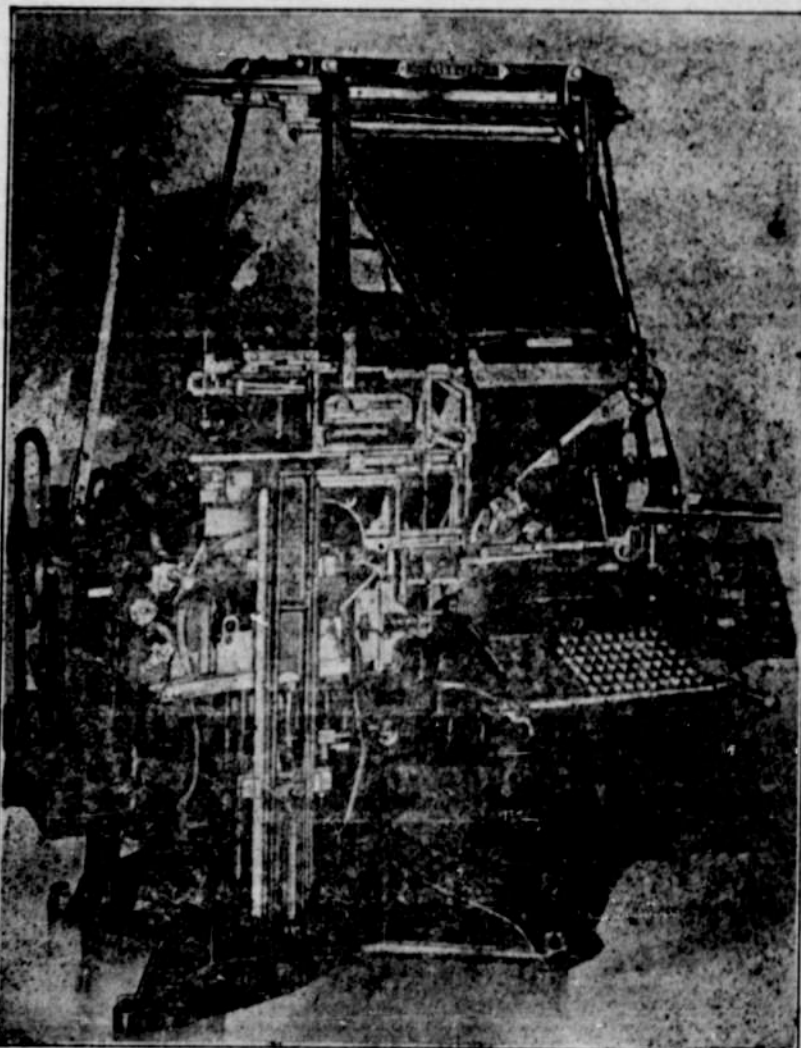
