science, is to leave legislation on religious matters strictly alone with the one exception of protecting each and every citizen in the right of worshipping or of refraining from worship according to the dictates of his own conscience. To the extent that we go beyond that, we are un-American and destructive of the freedom which this government was established to secure.

"It is certainly evident that our forefathers intended to make this country a happy home for all peoples of all faiths. They saw the folly of trying to make the New World a Baptist country or a Methodist country; a Catholic country or an Atheistic country. With wonderful insight they conceived the idea that men of all faiths might live together in harmony and neighborly good will by guaranteeing to each the right to worship according to his choice or not to worship at all, unless so disposed. They recognized the unquestionable act that the relation of each citizen to his God is a matter that other individuals or the state have no right to interfere with.

At 8 o'clock F. B. Jordan, who has the happy faculty of bobbing up at the psychological moment paid the prisoner a visit and informed him that by depositing with the chief of police \$50, he would be once more permitted to breathe the pure air of this land of the brave and home of the free.

Bibb dug up the \$50 and hurried to the Armory, where his pent-up eloquence was unceremoniously "Southern style" for one and a quarter hours. As Bibb commented on the Canon laws of the Holy Mother Church (?) one papal duke, no doubt sent to listen to the speaker and report to the Roman Catholic mayor, spoke right out in meeting and said: "That's a lie."

Quick as the Red Wing priest could turn a pancake into God, Bibb turned on the papist dupe and demanded if his remark was directed at the speaker personally. "If it is," said Bibb, "I shall proceed in a quarter of a second to show you where to head in at."

The unfortunate dupe was vehement in his declarations that such was not the case, whereupon Bibb proceeded with his subject, his audience greatly enjoying the digression.

Our information is that Bibb uncovered Rome to the great satisfaction of his audience. The prison bars acting as a sort of inspiration.
