While the editor was in jail for telling the truth about the corruption among the priests and nuns of Mt. Angel the following excellent article, showing the conditions in Italy, was sent in for publication. Those who can read between the lines will readily see that there were ample reasons for the beast to want to fight. Why, she is loosing ground in nearly every part of the world where she is best known, even right in the land of the Vatican itself:

"ROMANISM AND THE ITALIAN PEOPLE"

The newspapers of Italy convey the information that while there are fifty thousand pupils in the public schools of Rome, only 1,403 parents have asked that their children receive instruction in the Roman Catholic Religion. The clericals made such an ado over the refusal of the city administration to require the teaching of papal doctrines in these schools, that an opportunity was given the parents to express their desires through a popular vote, with the result that the clericals were overwhelmingly defeated. It seems to the Rev. Joseph Vital, who sends us this item, that the complaint of the clericals that the municipality is guilty of suppressing liberty of conscience is absurd in view of this fact. "What the clericals mean by liberty of conscience," he says, "is an imposition of their religion on a people who do not want it—a religion which, after all is not catholic, but purely papist."

Our correspondent who is a native of Italy, and is himself a convert from Romanism, and one of our most efficient Italian pastors in this county has this to say about the state of religion in the land of his birth:

"It is time to stop the false assertion that the Italian people are a Roman Catholic people. They are not. They are anti-clerical, and preeminently so. If you except certain where tradition has taken the place of reason, those who think they are convinced Romanists are a minority. The greatest number of so-called Roman Catholics do not follow the precepts of the Roman Catholic church. The greatest part of those inscribed as in the church are such because they were baptised in it, but many of them do not care for religion, many others are anti-Roman Catholics and anti-clericals, many have changed their religion; and yet the Roman church counts them among her sheep. Of such Catholics are the people of Italy composed. Where is the proof? Italian papers say that the proof is this: The Romanist religion instruction is not obligatory in the schools of Italy, and having been put at the disposal of the fathers of families, it has been refused by the majority.

"Therefore the hatred of the Romanists of this country against ex-Mayor Nathan of Rome is as unjust and deceitful as that of the Roman clericals. Let us give Commissioner Nathan such welcome as will make the Romanists of America ashamed of them selves and their bigotry."

We believe that many Roman Catholics in his country are already sorry that certain mis-guided Jesuits have broken out in irrational denunciation of Italy's Commissioner General to the Panama-Pacific Exposition. We shall probably hear little more of the suggested boycott of the exposition. Rome is too astute to press such an injudicious policy.—The Christian Advocate.
