The Nehalem river country has a great future before it. The river is long and free from obstructions and traverses a fine belt of heavy timber throughout its course.

Tillamook is attracting notice in the outside world. We are receiving letters every week making inquiries regarding the resources of the County. An era of prosperity is at hand.

The paper and package mail still continues to accumulate at North Yamhill. Probably the authorities are waiting to send it in a railroad that is to be built to Tillamook.

General Green B. Raum, Commissioner of the Pension office is making a brilliant record. He is rapidly clearing up all accumulated business and claims that have been in waiting so long will receive attention soon.

The Republican primaries in Portland were hotly contested. The Simon and Lotan factions fighting for the supremacy. The control of the city government seems to have been the bone of contention. Lotan carried the day.

Senator Leland Stanford will resign the presidency of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company and C. P. Huntington will probably be his successor. Senator Stanford will give his attention in a great measure to his university.

Tillamook is beginning to receive due recognition at the hands of Congress and the Government authorities. The establishment of a life saving station at this place will be of great benefit and will give mariners more confidence in entering this port.

Tillamook County is allowed two delegates to the Democratic State Convention which meets in Portland April 25th. There will be 192 delegates all told. It is almost a foregone conclusion that Penoyer will be renominated for governor, and the principal part of their fight will be to try to re-elect him, as they have little hopes of electing a congressman or securing control of the legislature so as to elect a successor to Senator J. H. Mitchell. If the Republicans make a good nomination for governor, however, Penoyer's chances will be very slim.

SLIGHTLY PREMATURE.

The laugh is on the free trade Chicago Herald, which lately printed a four column article by an emissary sent to England to prove that the coal miners there are better off than in this country. The correspondent did this to his own satisfaction in his long winded article, representing the miners as well paid, prosperous and perfectly contented. Since the article was published the cable has brought news that 50,000 of these self same miners resolved to go on a strike to secure better pay.—Fitchburg Sentinel.

APROPOS.

The Arizona Kicker perpetrates the following which so nearly fits the circumstances in this town that we cannot refrain from publishing it: "We have just closed a bargain with Henry Shane, the well known contractor and builder, for a one story addition to the rear of our office, to be 11x14 in size. This room will be used as a gunsmith shop under our own personal management. This will give us, under one and the same roof, a great weekly paper, a job and book office, a grocery, a feed store, a hardware store, a butcher shop, a boot and shoe store, a signal station and a gunshop. Three years ago, upon our arrival in this town, we slept under a wagon for the first three nights, and the first money we had was a borrowed dollar."

RECIPROCITY.

The following is the gist of a proposition submitted by Secretary Blaine to the ways and means committee:

The President shall by proclamation declare all parts of the United States free to all products of any independent nation on the American hemisphere upon which export duties are now levied, so long as such nations admit free of all duties, breadstuffs, provisions, preserved meats, fish, vegetables, fruits and in fact all articles of food, lumber, refined petroleum and such other productions peculiar to the United States as may be agreed upon, provided, however, that this concession shall apply only to merchandise transported in vessels of the United States, or of the other countries entering into this agreement.

It is thought that this arrangement will not in any way conflict with the principles of protection for American industries, as the articles admitted free of duty from the South American States and the Sandwich Islands will not come in competition with our home products and manufactures. Besides it will stimulate commerce between the nations of the Western Hemisphere and discriminates in favor of American shipping industry.

HARMONY HERE.

The Yamhill Reporter seems disappointed because Hon. J. W. Maxwell did not receive the recommendation as joint representative for Tillamook and Yamhill counties and attributes the state of affair to a supposed political squabble in this county. The emphatic endorsement given Mr. Maxwell by the Republicans of this county shows clearly the high esteem in which he is held by the people and his record and work as a legislator is fully appreciated here, but he declined renomination though many were reluctant to entertain his refusal to make the race. Furthermore, all indications of a political squabble in this county have disappeared and Capt. Wm. D. Stillwell, who is recommended as joint representative, is very popular here and has not now and never did have any opposition that we know of. There is no danger but what the people of this county will stand firm with him.

OUR SCHOOLS.

The time is near at hand for the commencement of our schools, as the new building is approaching completion. And the question naturally suggests itself, who will

be engaged to teach our school? As yet, we are not informed, nor have we any idea who will be engaged. But we have this to offer: teaching the noblest of professions, is made a stepping stone to other positions. Why? Not because teachers dislike the work, or not but what they and their patrons know that they are fully competent. The principal reason their work is not fully appreciated, they do not receive the pay their work calls for. It is a mistaken notion that every one who has an education is a successful teacher; and not until that idea is abolished will our schools make any advancement. Failures are more frequent among the teachers than any other profession. And whenever a person identifies himself as possessing the necessary qualifications for a teacher, namely attainments of good moral character, ability to instruct and govern, then every reasonable means should be used to retain that person in our schools. We feel confident that the present Board of Directors will engage only those who are eminently qualified, whoever they may be.

Acknowledging the Principle.

The following extracts from the National Democrat fairly acknowledges the principle that the republicans have been contending for in reconstructing the rules of congress:

The republicans led by Reed have by their recent action made their responsibility absolute for all that the present house of representatives may do or fail to do.

We trust that no Democratic member of the house will at any time interpose one word of objection to any action by the majority upon pension bills. Let the republicans go ahead and keep their promises. Let it be impossible for them in the next campaign to charge any democrat with the responsibility for defeating any legislation for the Grand Army.

We are glad a democratic paper frankly asks to be relieved of the responsibility. The new rules make the majority absolutely responsible for the carrying out of the pledges which the party made to the people to be entrusted with the control of the law-making power. The old rules allowed a desperate minority to dictate terms to the majority, by assuming a bulldozing attitude and stopping all business before the house.

The republican party has always kept its promises when it has been in position to carry them out. It has now control of all three branches of the government and all republicans know that upon its record of keeping its pledges depends the future of the party. The democrats started in at this session, by dilatory tactics and by their old practices at filibustering, to prevent the republicans from going ahead and redeeming their pledges. The new rules and Speaker Reed thwarted them at this game and in the end it will appear that the people's confidence in the republican party has not been misplaced.
