

Democratic Delusions.

A democratic exchange talks to the farmers in this way: "If the farmers wish to do themselves or their country any good, the will, with one voice demand two things. First, the reduction of monopoly duties on the necessities of life, and second, the transfer to the free list of every article which has been made the subject of a 'trust.' Our considerate brother forgets the sugar-plum of Louisiana and Mississippi when he demands the reduction of duties on the necessities of life. Such action would drive these earnest Bourbons away from the fold. As regards the transfer to the free list of articles in the sale of which trusts have been formed, the worst we have to-day is Standard Oil, and it has never been protected. If sugar were placed on the free list to-morrow, the refiners would form a monopoly, and keep up the prices as they now are. England is one of the brightest examples of free trade, and there are as many trusts in Great Britain as in America. The democrats are very anxious to prove themselves in harmony with the laboring classes of the country, and especially the farmers; but the history of the country proves they favored slave labor in the south, made the most distinctive caste rule in one portion of the United States, and when the homestead bill was before congress fought it to the bitter end. Only for political purposes do the democrats desire to affiliate with the working classes, and when they have secured their votes they have no further use for them. Anything to beat the republican party and secure positions at the public crib, is the motto, and to accomplish this any means will be considered justifiable.—Times-Mountaineer.

Tariff Caucus.

It is almost certain that the republicans will hold a caucus on the tariff bill before it is reported to the house, and agree upon any changes that may seem advisable from a party standpoint. A republican member was discussing the matter with Speaker Reed, and referred to the many diverse opinions on the subject. The speaker said that the only thing to do was to hold a caucus and let the republicans air their differences then; that to bring a bill in under any other circumstances would lead to interminable confusion. Reed had had his way on so many questions that he will probably carry his point now, and, if so, there is more hope of getting a satisfactory bill than by allowing the democrats to offer amendments of an alluring nature, which may wreck the bill.

Even when it passes the house there may be breakers ahead, for there are so many presidential candidates in the senate that they would be jealous of McKinley and the prominence he would gain if he succeeded in framing a tariff bill which would become a law.

The Western men are still in conflict with those of the East on some of the schedules, and while they seem disposed to accept a less reduction than their people demand, they also insist that the East must share some of the duties and some of the reductions. It is rather a new thing to the East to be obliged to submit to any changes other than those that are beneficial to them, and in favor of the West. The more discussion there is on the bill the less dissatisfaction is apparent.

Alaska Expedition.

About the first of April a private exploring expedition will leave San Francisco for Alaska. Among those interested in the project are Capt. W. H. Ferguson, Capt. John Ross, Capt. L. W. Johnson, H. M. Serrys, John Shean and others. A company with a capital stock of \$350,000 was formed a few weeks since. A few days ago the parties interested purchased the Ferndale, a twin screw steamer with a speed of nine knots an hour. She has accommodations for twenty-four cabin passengers and will carry a crew of experienced fishers and a number of mining experts. The expedition is a private affair, organized to explore the unknown parts of Alaska and the islands adjacent, to prospect for mines and minerals, to trade with the natives, to hunt, fish, examine salmon creeks and take possession of cannery sites. The company proposes to locate and perfect titles to coal beds and gold mines. The party intends to sail down 2,000 barrels of salmon during the fishing season, thereby defraying the expenses of the expedition. The Ferndale having the exploring party on board will leave San Francisco April 10, and will not return until October next. The route mapped out by the explorers will take them first to Kodiak island, thence to St. Paul island, through Shelikoff straits to the Shumagin islands, Pirata cove, Unga harbor, Unimak pass, Amak island and Moffatt's cave. Returning from Behring sea, the expedition will visit the mouth of the Yukon and thence pass down the coast. The journey will be one of about 6,000 miles.

Canada's Annexation.

A writer in Harper's Weekly who claims to be well posted gives some interesting information regarding the possible union of the United States and Canada. The people along the line in the Northwest and in the maritime provinces, he says are in favor of annexation. He points out that commercial union would be a natural policy for both countries, but claims that the friendly feelings of the Canadians are not made warmer by the hostile tone of America toward England and Canada. The writer asserts that there is a great similarity in the people of the two countries, and in their mode of life, is undoubtedly correct. The people of Canada are becoming more thoroughly Americanized every day, and are dropping the old English habits and customs. This is almost wholly due to the influence of the people of the United States. If Canada could only rid herself of a certain class of English aristocracy sent over from Europe to govern her, it would not be long before the United States, if Canada was not annexed, would have a formidable rival on the American continent.

Invasion of Alaska.

News from San Francisco is to the effect that the invasion of Alaska for salmon fishing is in excess of all calculation. Despite the entire failure made by many canneries there last season the impression prevails that fortunes lie in the fishy tribes of Alaskan streams, and a great deal of money is being invested. Fully 2,500 sailors and fishermen, and as many more Chinese cannery hands are being sent north. The Alaskan salmon streams are small, except the great Yukon, which has not yet been fished, and such a wholesale raid upon them must necessarily soon deplete them and render the supply of fish too small for profitable work. However this seasons operations ought to determine the status of Alaska's salmon industry. At present no market calculations can be based upon it, and the possibilities of an enormous product serve to keep the market low, while the supply is not sufficiently certain to warrant canners contracting at figures based upon that fact.

Bismark's Birthday Gifts.

The list of Bismark's birthday gifts is amusing. They include two mastiffs, forty-three drinking cups, over a hundred long pipes, three hunting guns, much tobacco, dozens of canes, innumerable packages of preserves, cakes and candies sent by farmer's wives, barrels of egg, sides of bacon, cushions, rugs and an enormous salmon from Wales.—Oregonian.

Prince of Wales a Wreck.

The Prince of Wales was in Paris on his way back from Berlin, and was received with more than usual impressment.
