The Montana Senatorial contest has not yet been disposed of, but it is thought the Republican contestants will be admitted by a strict party vote.

Samuel J. Randall, once the able leader of the Protection wing of the Democratic party is sinking very rapidly and his death is expected at any time.

We understand that Mr. F. M. Lamb will make the race for Assessor on the Republican ticket. There is no doubt of his election by a large majority.

Most of the nominees of the Democratic party for county offices made last Saturday, are fairly good selections, but laying political affiliations aside, we think the Republican ticket is a better and stronger one.

The Mississippi Valley and the East in general has been subject to a series of violent cyclones and storms, and the Signal Service department predicts more coming and cautions the people to be on their guard. The floods on the Mississippi are subsiding.

There seems to be a misunderstanding between Leland Stanford and his successor as President of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, C. P. Huntington. Huntington has intimated that the company has mixed in politics heretofore and he proposes to stop it.

It appears from recent caucuses held by the Republicans of Congress that there is almost an universal sentiment in favor of practical free-coinage of silver, or at least that the coinage of silver will be greatly increased. This will favor the western states in a great measure.

The Republican county ticket is a good one and worthy of support from beginning to end, and if every loyal Republican will do his duty by turning out to the polls and voting the straight ticket on election day, every candidate will be elected, with majorities ranging from 150 to 250.

It appears more evident every year that the West is becoming the controlling power in national affairs. At one time all legislation seemed to be dependent on the sanction of the large monopolies in the East, but the West is fast becoming a potent factor in all important matters.

The committee in Congress which has control of the tariff question has about completed its labors, and the majority of both houses seem willing to concur in the report generally. The tariff has been thoroughly revised, and arranged so it will benefit the greatest number of people. Of course, there will be some objections as the tariff cannot be arranged to suit all, but it is thought that the bill as it comes up will with a few changes meet with general approval and satisfaction.

There is already much dissatisfaction shown among Democrats on account of the endorsement of McDermott for Treasurer. Many say they will vote for the regular Republican nominee, W. C. King in preference, and some go so far as to say they will vote the straight Republican ticket since the Democrats had to accept a cast-off Republican for a county office. It is authentically reported that certain Democrats claim that some Republican promised sixty Republican votes for McDermott if he received the Democratic endorsement. We hope there was no bargain or understanding in regard to this matter.

We make the following statement in order to correct a false report: Of the 49 delegates in the Republican convention, Mr. R. R. Hays received 31 votes, and only 25 was necessary for a choice. One blank was voted and the party who voted the blank ticket discovered his mistake too late, or Mr. Hays would have received 32 votes, lacking only one of having a two-thirds majority. In fact, he could have given seven votes to his opponents and still retained a majority. No proxies were given to friends of Mr. Hays except those who were already for him. Two votes would not have changed the result as has been stated.

A man who wrote us a letter for publication some time ago has written a letter criticizing us for not publishing his productions. We will say right here that we will not undertake to publish everything sent us by any means. We are glad to have people express their opinions through the columns of our paper, but they cannot take any more liberties than we do ourselves, nor can they dictate to us what we shall publish or say even if their names are signed to their articles. We will not publish anything scurrilous or untrue regarding our friends, whom we know to be good men, no matter if it is in the way of signed correspondence, nor will we treat our enemies wrong in this way. This is not the mission of a newspaper and the sooner some people realize it, the better.

We have as yet no criticisms to offer regarding the Democratic nominees for county officers and will engage in nothing but a fair and legitimate campaign against them, but the action of their convention in endorsing H. McDermott for County Treasurer is very queer to say the least. McDermott was a candidate for re-nomination before the Republican convention and failed to secure the support and endorsement of his own party. He now comes out as a candidate on his own responsibility, (unless he has been promised support by some Democrats and a few Republicans,) and looks to the Democratic party for his principal support. Is it possible that the Democrats of this county will support a man who has no standing in his own party? It seems to us that all fair-minded Democrats would rather support a straight out Republican who has the respect and

confidence of his own party. It takes considerable gall for a man to make a race for an office after trying to secure a nomination and failing in convention. Surely he never expects any further favors at the hands of the Republicans. And, how can a man so utterly disregard all political principle in order to secure an office which pays so little as Treasurer of this county? There surely can be nothing more in it than his regular salary or percentages! If so, this matter and the Treasurer's books should be investigated.
