Be it enacted, etc., That there be and is hereby established a life-saving station at the entrance of Tillamook bay, in the state of Oregon, and the secretary of the treasury is hereby required to provide for such establishment and supply the same with such necessary life-saving crew and furnishings as are provided by law and under existing regulations in like cases; provided, that the same shall not cost more than \$10,000, which sum shall be available for said purpose out of the present year's estimates. —Oregonian.
