Another clerk has been allowed for the Oregon City Land Office and the salary of the Chief clerk has been increased. This is a good move as the force in the Land Office there has been greatly overworked and business delayed accordingly.

The Buffalo News calls attention to the great strike of English coal miners for a share in the enhanced profits of their employers, and adds: "It will be borne in mind that Britain enjoys all the luxuries of Free Trade; and yet an army of miners is on strike."

The lovers of peace in France and in Austria have good cause for the anxiety which they manifest in regard to the retirement of the great statesman of Europe. There is no power now to stay the alliance of absolutism in its representatives, the Czar of Russia and the Emperor of Germany. This bodes a terrible political reaction, which could be stayed only by an uprising of the European peoples in defense of their rights.

John D. Rockefeller, who now has an income of \$750 an hour, began life as a retail grocer. Yet there are some men in the grocery business who haven't much more than half that income.

Together the Republican Administration and the Republican Congress have fully restored confidence in all branches of business and industry, and given to producers of every class an assurance of protection in the enjoyment of the best market the world affords.

The recommendation of Capt. Wm. D. Stillwell as joint Representative for Tillamook and Yamhill counties was well received by the Yamhill delegation and his nomination was readily agreed upon. There is no doubt of his election, and it will be an honor richly deserved by Mr. Stillwell.

Bismarck, the German Chancellor, sent his resignation to the German Emperor the other day, and to his surprise, it was accepted. The young Emperor has views of his own and so has Bismarck. The two represented irreconcilables who had to get out of each other's way, and it appears that Bismarck was the first to go.

Nehalem seems to have fared much better in the way of appropriations than Tillamook. Even though Tillamook did not receive due recognition, we are glad to see Nehalem's good fortune and the amount that place will get is none too much. Every dollar that is to be expended there will bring ten to the property owners of that locality.

An advertisement for 500 white horses in a Philadelphia newspaper some time ago, attracted a large crowd of all kind of horses to the place; but when the owners of them discovered that they were wanted merely to have some show advertisement painted on their ribs, for which they would receive a complimentary ticket to the show they went away in high dudgeon. The owners had expected to find a ready sale for their white steeds.

It is not to be denied that the long crusade against Mormonism, which now seems at last to have reached a point where success can be foreseen, is in a certain sense a tribute to the ability of Brigham Young, who established the church in Utah, and organized the things which have been so hard to overcome. The original Mormon leader, Joe Smith, was a man of superficial talents, but Brigham Young had elements of real greatness in his composition, if he had chosen to employ them in a proper way and for laudable purposes.

The New York Mail and Express gives three great republican facts: First, that three hundred manufacturing establishments have been started in ten cotton states within two months, with a capital of \$6,000,000. Second, that 222,437 tons of first-class iron and steel ships have been built at Chester, Pa., since 1870. Third, that forty-six iron and steel steamships, of 98,743 tons of aggregate measurement, have been built since 1880 by William Cramp & Son, Philadelphia, not including six ships now being constructed, with 20,866 ton of aggregate measurement.

The new tariff bill will, it is estimated, reduce the revenue \$60,000,000 a year, \$41,000,000 of which will come from the customs and \$19,000,000 from the internal taxes. This is a larger cut, proportionately on the former than was proposed in any preceding bill but, throughout the west at least, the cut in this respect is considered scarcely large enough. The Globe-Democrat of St. Louis correctly says, that in this section of the country the people would rather have the reduction on the internal taxes \$12,000,000 or \$10,000,000 than \$19,000,000, and the difference made up in sugar and the articles put on the free list. This is undoubtedly true.
