A FEW POINTERS.

Reasons why the Republican Ticket will receive a large majority in Tillamook:

A. T. White for School Superintendent, comes well recommended and when elected we expect him to do a great deal of good for our schools.

This being the case, let every Republican forget his little local bickerings and petty personal spite, and vote the straight Republican ticket. Beware of the mud-slinger, he who peddles defamatory accusations, he is abroad in the land and the tongue of slander cares not who its victim is. THE ORIGIN OF IT.
We do not pretend to disguise the fact that there is a small deflection in the Republican ranks, but the Democrats have the same difficulty to contend with. There are always a few politicians who are ready to fly the track on personal grounds, or from political disappointment. We see this state of affairs always at every election, and generally, as is the case in this county, it will not amount to much, and is not likely to change the result where the majority is so large and decisive as it is in this county. While the "Flick" in this county demands attention, it is not large enough to be alarming, and is not half so great as is represented by a few of the leaders.
In the first place, the fight was made against one man because he could not be forced into line to support a certain newspaper(?), and afterward extended to others because they were friendly to him. The newspaper referred to, made a fight for supremacy, and as it was a financial failure and involved a few others in its fight by securing aid from them, the fight was kept up bitterly with a hope that success would come and enable the concern to pay its debts. Those who advanced money on its account are held to it yet with a hope of recovering their money, and surely not from any merit the sheet contains. If that paper can succeed in having the Democratic ticket elected, it will expect favors from the officials in the way of county printing, or will be leased to Democrats. This is the gist of the whole business, and is the whole and only cause of the slanderous charges made before the Republican convention.
The advantages possessed by this county are common to all the different localities, but Nehalem pre-eminently takes the lead for timber and minerals; Nestucca for stock raising and bee-culture; Tillamook, with her surrounding prairies, tide-lands and spruce forests, is an excellent location for general farming, dairying, and lumbering, and Netarts will be a favorite pleasure resort.
The governor claims credit for the prosperous condition of the state, the extinction of the debt, the growth of the school fund, the increased receipts from taxation, and, in the same breath, condemns the legislature for what he calls extravagant appropriations. In point of fact, the state has prospered through natural causes, immigration, development, increase of commerce, exploiting of resources and so forth, with which Penoyer has no more to do than the man in the moon. The increase of legislative appropriations was a natural consequence of this increased prosperity as a man who is making money rapidly enlarges his scale of living. Though the governor is entitled to no credit for the prosperity of the state, he must bear his share of responsibility for what he calls its extravagance, as no bill of the last legislature became a law without his consent, expressed or silent.—Oregonian.

It has been shown that Governor Penoyer approved at least two acts which expressly exempt municipal bonds from taxation. His answer is that he approved them in haste, without taking time to give them examination. He therefore pleads guilty to carelessness. It is to be regretted, however, that a professional champion of the people is obliged to make this confession. We thought we had a champion of popular rights who watched while others slept.—Oregonian.
