There are hundreds of acres of unsurveyed lands in Tillamook county, which would soon be taken up by settlers of a substantial kind financially, men who would improve this county in a way that would soon make it the banner county of the state, if it was once opened for settlement. But as it is now, they do not care to settle on land and improve it when there seems to be no chance of its being surveyed for years to come.

The Voice seems to have taken exceptions to one of its candidates because he does not choose to swear allegiance to H. McDermott, the Republican bolter. It says: "Let Mr. Roberts declare through the columns of the Voice, that he intends voting for every man on the Democratic ticket, and will willingly vote for H. McDermott," which gentleman's candidacy seems to be the real and only cause of that paper being inflicted upon the public.

The people of Tillamook have apparently aroused from their apathy, and are preparing for active work to build up our town. A Telephone and Telegraph company has been formed and incorporated, and a Water company is now being incorporated. There is nothing which will enhance the value of property in this place like a system of water works for protection from fire, and with a telegraph line to Astoria. The outside world will soon know that Tillamook has in earnest awakened.

TIT FOR TAT.

Some of those who are bolting and trying to defeat a part of the Republican county ticket should remember that there is a reckoning day for the future. Harmony in the Republican ranks just now may prevent a split that will last for years, and that will be fraught all along with the most bitter partisan warfare. A few men may hold the balance of power, but they cannot kill the men they defeat, and if a few Republicans in this county are going to try to deliver a part of the county offices to the Democrats, there will be long drawn turmoil in Tillamook. If this policy is forced against us, it will not be the end of it. Mind what we say, there is a reckoning day in the future.

THE BANNER REPUBLICAN COUNTY.

There is no reason why the coming election will not show Tillamook to be the banner Republican county in Oregon. Columbia county leads in this respect now by a small margin, and there is no doubt but the next count will show this county to have the largest Republican majority, in proportion to the number of voters, of any county in the state, by large odds. Let it be so, and let every Republican attend the polls on election day and swell the majority to as large proportions as possible. This will command attention in the state legislature and in our delegation to the national congress and gain for us many advantages. Look at the example of Nehalem! She is already reaping a rich reward for her loyalty, and the whole county will do well to profit by her example.

E PLURIBUS UNUM.

Let us for once lay aside all petty fights and local bickering, and fight together in the common cause of our party. The Republicans of this county have a very large majority, and if they will stand manfully together on the whole ticket, and lay aside personal strife, more good will be accomplished for the county within the next two years than has ever been heretofore. As long as we fight among ourselves, we never

can get the ear or command the respect of those in authority who can benefit the county. Let us speak with one voice and all at once, in tones too emphatic to be mistaken. When you see a man taking the lead in enterprise, do not pull him down, but pull yourself up on a plane even with him and bring everybody else up that you can. The Republican party in Tillamook county to-day, is in good trim and has the power to carry the battle without losing a man and accomplishing a good work. Will it do it!

NEHALEM.

The almost unanimous Republican vote returned from Nehalem at the last election has attracted much attention abroad, and was one of the means of bringing that place into favorable notice with our congressman, Binger Hermann and in securing for it the much needed appropriation of \$10,000 to be used to start improvements on the Nehalem bar. This improvement is necessary to develop the vast resources of that country, and the people of that locality very sensibly realize that they can always accomplish more by pulling together as a unit. Last election, it is said, there was but one Democratic vote in Nehalem and that was a mistake. We think it was.

We have no fears but what Nehalem will do her duty at the polls and send in a solid phalanx of Republican votes, but we urge it upon all the voters in the precinct to turn out on election day and make the phalanx as large as possible. A TAX-PAYER SPEAKS.

ED. HEADLIGHT.—Your article in the HEADLIGHT of last date addressed to the tax-payers is a timely one, in some respects. The friends of the the present County Treasurer, (the political nullus filius protegee of the Voice) have claimed for him an immaculateness, little short of Divinity. The most important of county affairs is, of course, the finances.

Were a store, a mill, a bank or any private business concern to be conducted upon the principles you demonstrate, it would soon wind up. The law that the Treasurer shall settle according to the stubs of the Sheriff's receipt book, and shall accept only such amount of county orders as shall have been actually paid to the Sheriff, is so plain that only a most ignorant man, or a most dishonest one, would attempt to evade its provisions.

One of two things is evident: Either the Sheriff did not pay in the full amount of cash he has collected or the Treasurer has violated the law grossly in accepting more orders than should have been accepted.

Let me also call your attention to another manifest dereliction: When a private citizen is paying interest and comes in receipt of otherwise idle money, he as a matter of business pays the idle money on the debt he owes and stops the interest. The county is paying interest as we all know and feel about tax-paying time.

At last term of court the Treasurer received from two saloon licenses \$800.—Why was not this money immediately applied to call in orders and stop interest? Do the people want to pay interest and let the Treasurer hold the money until it suits his convenience to pay off warrants, the county paying heavy interest? Is that business? T.
