She will leave San Francisco on her first trip Monday, May 25th, with a cargo of general merchandise for this place. The commander of the new steamer is Captain Crawford, well and favorably known in Tillamook as the efficient first officer of the Str. South Coast, formerly in the same trade. The Truckee may be looked for about Friday next.

Drowned.

The following relative to the accidental drowning of John P. Sherlock, of this place, in the Columbia river while on his way to visit his parents in Portland, are taken from the Oregonian, of May 13th:

John P. Sherlock, son of Mr. William Sherlock, who was well known in this city, met his death by drowning in the Columbia a few minutes after 9 o'clock Sunday evening.

Mr. Sherlock has lately been in business at Tillamook, and a few days ago left that place for Portland on the steam lumber schooner Louis Olsen, intending to pay a short visit to his home in this city.

At an early hour yesterday morning the schooner came into the harbor, with her flag displayed at half mast, and Captain Frank Johnson immediately appeared before the United States local inspectors and made a statement explaining the manner of the unfortunate accident.

Progress up the river, against a heavy current, was tedious and slow. Mr. Sherlock, the cook, and the captain were reclining on some lumber which was piled on the deck near the galley, on the starboard side, when night overtook the steamer. Arriving off the mouth of the Willamette, Mate John Jensen, who was at the wheel, was on the lookout for the light, which marks the course for incoming vessels. The light not appearing to view, at seemingly the right time, Sherlock got up and walked slowly forward, on the starboard side, until about amidships, when he stopped to scan the shore.

At this juncture the boom of the main mast, which carried the sails spread, swung gently around, and touched the man. He made a grab at the canvas, but missing it, he was plunged headlong into the water.

The helm was instantly put hard over and the vessel swung clear of the spot. The iron dingle was cut loose, thrown into the water, and manned by the mate and a sailor. Assistance arrived too late, however, for the drowning man had disappeared beneath the dark, rolling waters.

He was heard to cry out when he fell in, and again when he came to the surface. A second before he went down for the last time he shouted in a half-strangled voice: "Hurry up, or I am lost."

It is the opinion of the captain that the unfortunate man, who is known to be an excellent swimmer, was taken with cramps, which rendered him unable to save himself.

The Olsen drifted down the river as far as Willow bar, and cruised around in the vicinity for an hour, in the hope of picking the man up, but to no avail.

Johnie, as he was familiarly called by those who knew him here, was about 34 years old and unmarried. He had been in business in Tillamook for some time, and was universally liked and respected by all who were acquainted with him.

He was a good citizen and one who will be missed by friends and acquaintances alike.

Up to the time of going to press, the body had not been recovered, although there are searching parties at work, and \$100 reward has been offered for the recovery of the body.

Look Out for the Cars.

The following encouraging railroad news is taken from the Astorian of May 15th:

Yesterday afternoon Dr. Alfred Kinney received a dispatch from Mr. Barr, the chief engineer of the Albany and Astoria railway company, saying that he would be down here with his entire force on Friday morning's boat, and would immediately begin operations.

There are about twenty men in the party, and they will bring their pack horses and surveying outfit, and start in to complete the survey of the road, preparatory to grading and track-laying.

There hasn't been much talk about this, but there is \$2,000,000 behind it, and the Albany & Astoria road is an assured fact.

Regarding the matter Tuesday's Herald says:

Chief Engineer W. B. Barr, of the Albany & Astoria railroad, will leave this city in a few days, with a force of surveyors, for Astoria, where he goes to complete the location of the line of the road from Astoria to Tillamook. The route is already surveyed from Albany to Tillamook, and as soon as the survey of this last 60 miles is made it is expected that graders will commence the work of construction, beginning on the Astoria end of the line.

The company already has a railroad construction plant, and it is said by those on the inside that a large force of men will be put to work grading the road that is ultimately to connect Albany and Astoria.

Justice's Court.

Garnishment suit was brought before Squire Ralston in Garibaldi against Mrs. F. Galloway to secure wages due Capt. O. R. Staples for payment of costs in the recent suit against him for refusing to work the roads. The action was sustained and Staples will have to pay the costs as adjudged.

Decoration Day.

This route is already becoming popular and it is thought that but a short time will elapse until a good wagon road will be put through from Sheridan to intersect the county road already laid out in Tillamook county up the Nestucca valley.—Courier.
