Arrangements have been made to have a grand 4th of July picnic and celebration at Union Peak.

S. H. Rock and W. E. Baxter, of little Nestucca, were in the city the first of this week for a few days.

A Sunday school has been organized at Union Peak school-house. The attendance is very large.

I. R. Thomas, representing the Stockton Flour Mills, of San Francisco, came in on the Louis Olsen.

Max Levy, a commercial tourist, of San Francisco, loomed up Tuesday on his annual pilgrimage.

Wilbur Stillwell is getting along as well as could be expected, considering the nature of his wound.

There will be a meeting next Saturday, June 7, at 1 P. M., in Hadley's hall to make arrangements for holding a celebration on July 4th.

Several traveling salesmen have just arrived in Tillamook, and our merchants are laying in orders for goods.

The Republican ticket with the exception of County Judge was elected by a small majority in Yamhill county.

Wentherly & Findley, of Woods, are building an addition to their store. They have a large stock of goods and are receiving more all the time.

The toll rate on the Baxter road will remain the same as last year, \$3.00 for round trip instead of \$1.50 as published in this paper some time ago.

C. N. Drew has moved into the city and will build a sash and door factory. He will be prepared to turn out all kinds of bracket and scroll work, also.

The vote in this precinct was 297, and on a straight vote the Republican majority is about 100, though there is no consolation in considering the matter.

Krebs Bros., of Woods, have bought the steam saw-mill at Oretown and have moved the engine to their mill in Woods. They will use steam power hereafter.

At an early hour Tuesday morning the throttle valve of the engine in Barker & Smith's sawmill blew off, causing some little excitement but hurting no one.

The Nehalem country stood by nobly and Union Peak made an excellent showing. If Farmer had gone to the lower end of the country, he would have changed the result there likely.

It is probable that some important changes will be made in mail routes soon. The matter is in consideration and a postoffice inspector has made a trip over some of the routes in this county.

A view of Haystack rock near the mouth of the Nestucca river, as seen from the road on the hills back of Woods, is truly grand. The rock is said to be over 300 feet high and stands about three furlongs from shore in the breakers.

The Republican candidates for precinct officers in this precinct went down with the balance of the ticket. For justice A. W. Severance received 133 votes and W. S. Thompson 143. Constable, A. J. Stillwell 121; P. H. M. Smith 153.

The barbers have raised the price of shaving Republicans, on account of the extreme length of their faces. The Democratic face is so broad with smiles that they come under the same category, but mugwumps can get a shave for nothing.

The cemetery near this place should receive more attention. Additional ground should be secured and the whole inclosed with a neat fence. No doubt there are many who would place monuments over the graves if the grounds were improved and the title secure.

Owing to a rush of work at his office in Albina, Dr. Wise, the dentist, was not able to arrive in Tillamook as soon as expected. He is expected every day now, and will be accompanied by an Albina capitalist who represents parties who have an "eye on Tillamook" for investments.

Body Recovered.

The Oregonian of June 4th says:—A dispatch was received by the county coroner yesterday, notifying him that the body of the late John Sherlock, who was drowned in the Columbia on the 9th of May by falling overboard from the schooner Louis Olsen, had been recovered near Cathlamet, sixty miles from the place the unfortunate young man met his sad fate. The body was found by Wm. Cook, floating down the river, and by this time is considerably decomposed. The remains will be shipped to Portland at once and then buried by the family.

A Relic of the Tillamook Tribe.

J. C. Bewley, of Bay City, brought to this place Thursday and presented to Professor Doughty for the Normal cabinet of collections, a gun that was formerly owned by Chief Kilches, the last chief of the Tillamook Indians. The weapon is a double-barrelled shotgun, and does not look very old. One would suppose it be thirty or forty years old, but it bears no mark or figure, and may be much older. The barrels are very long and apparently of good material, about the size of No. 12 gun of modern make, and must have cost a handsome price in its day. Tradition says Chief Kilches killed a great many Indians in his day in protecting the whites, as he was a friendly Indian. Mr. Bewley says the gun has a very interesting history, which he will send as soon as he gets home. He also brought over a mortar and pestle which were hewed from solid stone, and a large number of arrowheads of many forms and sizes. Mr. Bewley's donation makes a valuable addition to the collection at the Normal cabinet and one much appreciated.—Mounouth correspondence to the Statesman.

Gone Democratic.

The Democrats have succeeded in electing most of the county ticket. There were 830 votes polled in the county, an increase of 270 over the vote two years ago. The following is the vote:

Taking the vote on State Treasurer as a basis, the regular Republican majority in the county is 178. Hermann ran ahead of his ticket and Thompson ran so far behind as to have a majority of 22 against him in this county. Those who scratched Thompson in favor of Penoyer are among the faction that defeated the county ticket.
