The President has approved the pension bill.

St. Louis is suffering from excess. Several deaths have occurred.

There is imminent danger of a famine in Japan. The rice crop failed.

A company of British capitalists have been formed to purchase the Roach ship building yards.

The Oregon State Teacher's Association met in Salem last Monday. A large attendance is expected during the session.

After all the money that has been expended on the Panama canal, it has been decided that the canal is an utter failure.

Wyoming has been admitted as a state by a strict party vote. The state will be allowed one representative in the 51st Congress.

Every week brings news of destructive storms and cyclones in various states. The Pacific coast escaped that class of disaster.

A fire in Morrison, Colorado, destroyed by fire Monday. 600. The fire was started by careless handling of fireworks.

The Senate committee of the Indiana Legislature has decided to report favorably the lottery bill, and the amount to be paid annually one million two hundred fifty thousand dollars.

There is a great deal of opposition in the South to any move in the way of securing a Federal election law. It seems that the South is unconvinced by anything that is conducive to a fair election in that section.

It is reported that Postmaster Wanamaker has presidential aspirations. There is a harmony in the Republican ranks in his state, Pennsylvania, and he is endeavoring to reach a compromise.

The population of Chicago this year is over one million. The race between Chicago and Philadelphia for second place in the great cities of the world will be very close. It is estimated that Chicago will in a few years outstrip New York in population.

John L. Sullivan is engaged in a campaign of abusive epithets on Mulattoes, and of his former trainers. Every word that the brute says is faithfully recorded by the Associated Press and sent to the daily newspapers, and is published to the world. His words are reported with much attention as if they had been by the President of the United States.

The House has passed bill 276 of that body providing that all officers and inspectors of the customs service who receive per diem pay shall have the same leave of absence as that allowed to clerks and other employees in the department at Washington. The House would pass this bill too. All such accidental discriminations against any classes of government servants

as this and the fact that the post-office clerks have not an eight hour day should be removed, and removed by extending to all the liberal treatment that is extended to some.—N. Y. Press.

At the reunion of the Army of the Tennessee in Chicago, on the first of next September, it is intended to unveil the great equestrian statue of General Grant, in Lincoln Park, and to make on the occasion a military and civic demonstration such as the West has never seen. According to the programme, as at present laid out, the Seventh regiment of New York and other military bodies of note throughout the country will be invited to participate. Thousands of Grand Army veterans and several of the military regiments of Illinois and adjoining states will be in line, and the demonstration will be one worthy of the great soldier whose memorial will be dedicated on that day. Grand Army men in particular desire to make the occasion a memorable one in the history of the country.—Statesman.

AN ORIGINAL PACKAGE.

The Kansas Chautauqua assembly has been in session at Ottawa, Kan., for the past two or three days. No sooner had it got in good running order before a Kansas City liquor dealer opened an original package saloon. This incensed the temperance people of Ottawa to such a degree that they Saturday night met and formed a defense league. A fund of three thousand dollars was subscribed to pay the expenses of the league, and a resolution was passed unanimously providing that a committee should capture each original package dealer, tar and feather him and ship him back to Missouri labeled: "An original package from Kansas for Missouri."

THE CENSUS FARCE.

Under the Constitution of the United States Congress must take the census as often as once in every ten years, but it may take it more frequently if it sees fit. It begins to look as though it would be wise to pitch overboard the present census and begin all over again, since from nearly every city in the Union there comes the same complaints. If Congress would order the census to be taken on the 1st of October, and would weed out a lot of questions which are now being asked, the result would certainly be much more satisfactory than it will be under the pending enumeration. There is no doubt but that the census in Albany will show several hundred less than the actual population. The returns have already been forwarded to Washington and there are people who have escaped the enumeration.—Herald.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY MORTGAGES.

The following is taken from the mortgage abstract furnished by the County Clerk to the Assessor July 1st:

Whole number of mortgages 219. Total amount, \$132,947.00, divided as follows:

On Town property, 27 mortgages, \$9518.00; Timber lands, 63 mortgages, \$34,626.00, on 12585 acres, an average of \$2.75 per acre; agricultural lands, 100 mortgages, held by individuals, \$64,678.00 on 13886 acres, an average of \$4.66 per acre; 29 School Fund mortgages, \$23,225.00 on 6481 acres, an average of \$3.58 per acre, being 32952 acres of timber and agricultural land mortgaged for \$122,529.00, a general average of \$3.72 per acre.

There was 158616 acres of land listed on the assessment roll last year. This shows that one acre in every five is mortgaged at the average value of \$3.72 per acre. We are not posted as to mortgages in the counties but will hazard the opinion that few counties will show a lower percentage either in acreage or value.

This is an increase over last year of \$8,275.00 in School Fund mortgages and \$40,082.00, in all other kinds.

CONGRESSIONAL FORECAST.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The appropriation bills will occupy most, if not all the time of the senate during the week, and the tariff is likely to go over until next week. The Indian, District of Columbia and legislative appropriation bills will be discussed, and there is a probability that the Idaho statehood bill will come up. The senate will probably adjourn Thursday, over the Fourth until Monday.

In the house the first three days of the week will be devoted to the consideration of the election bill, which will be placed on its passage on Wednesday. No programme for the remainder of the week has been arranged, but Thursday will probably be set apart for the consideration of the national bankruptcy bill, and an adjournment will probably be taken on Thursday over the Fourth until the Monday following. The silver bill conference report may come up this week, but may be deferred.

Our fore-fathers builded better than they knew, but when they were shedding their blood so freely on the battle-field and their families suffering for the necessities of life, they no doubt realized that they were sacrificing themselves for posterity and that their children would reap the benefits of the victory. Besides, their brave struggle and the successful carrying-out of their plans has had a great influence over the balance of the world and has been the cause of much governmental reform in countries where monarchical tyrants have ruled.

It is on account of the brave and daring deeds of those men that we celebrate to-day. This is why we shout ourselves hoarse and fire fire-crackers. But, let us not forget the true and primary purpose of these celebrations in our patriotic hilarity.
