One of our hotel men is thinking of offering one of the county officers \$10 and free board at his hotel for the coming year, for the sake of having his house called the "official hotel."

The war between the opposition photographers is waxing hot, and there will soon be a premium paid to subjects who are willing to sit for a photograph, if prices fall for the next few days as rapidly as they have been. This is equal to doing the county printing for nothing, minus ten dollars.

The Governor of Louisiana has vetoed the Lottery bill, but as over two-thirds of the members of both House and Senate are in favor of it, it is likely to be passed over his veto and submitted to the people. The sum paid the State, by the company, is \$1,250,000 per annum for twenty-five years from January 1st 1884.

At a conference of Republicans of Congress to decide on a course to pursue regarding the proposed silver bill, a compromise favorable to the advocates of free coinage was agreed upon. Free coinage will not be established, but the Treasury will be authorized to purchase 4,500,000 ounces of silver a month and issue legal tender silver certificates to the amount purchased. This will increase the circulating medium quite rapidly, and its effect on finances is hard to predict, though it seems that if the circulation of money is increased, it would benefit the poor classes and those who are in debt.

Those who are sportively inclined should form a stock-company and secure grounds for a permanent race track. The land can be obtained cheaper now than it can in the future and it would be a paying investment. The grounds could be used for county fairs, and the admission fees and stand privileges would more than pay expenses. If the grounds were under the management of a company, suitable regulations could be maintained and a recurrence of the shameful proceedings of last Saturday avoided. As lumber is cheap here a grand stand could be erected, and those attending the races could rest more comfortably than as heretofore on a rickety fence, besides being out of the way of the noisy crowd around the pool-box. Let us have a race track by all means.

WHICH IS CHEAPER.

It is by far cheaper for the county to pay some good printer a fair price to have its work done, than to give it to a "botch" for ten dollars less than nothing. Everybody knows how the work has been done by our cotemporary. In the first place the print was too poor to be read, and there was so many errors in figures and descriptions that the whole thing was worthless. That was money thrown away by the county, and those mistakes are sure to cause endless litigation and trouble.

QUITE A GROWTH.

Since August last (the time when our cotemporary started) the subscription list of the HEADLIGHT has almost doubled, and the advertising patronage has increased in

like proportion. Besides, we have enlarged and greatly improved the paper. Our patronage is now increasing as fast as the county is increasing in population, and we venture to say that we have the largest circulation in proportion to the number of voters in the county of any county paper in the state of Oregon. This shows how much opposition has hurt us.

\$10.00, AHEAD.

We shall publish the county advertising (or such parts of it as will interest our readers) just the same as if no bids were made. Of course we will get nothing for it, but we will be \$10 ahead of the watchtower in doing it. The county records are open for inspection and publication and the money our "rodent" cotemporary paid to get to do the work does not give them any copyright or exclusive privilege, except of being minus \$10 in coin. We should advise the court to collect the money in advance, as no responsible firm can do such business, and it would be too bad to make the bondsmen suffer for the sake of having an "official paper."

BREVIER vs. NONPAREIL.

L. J. Johnson, of our cotemporary says that he would rather set the county advertising in Brevier as it is larger and easier to handle. He would do better stacking cord-wood as it is still larger and easier to handle. Any printer knows that much better time (considering the number of words) can be made setting smaller type, and the space it occupies is much less. A man that would make such assertions and such a bid as this man made, would be "guyed" out of a town if there was a Printer's Union about. It is a common saying among printers that such "rats" should be in hell setting red-hot "Minion" at three cents per thousand "ems." Nonpareil is the recognized face for all legal printing, and is the size always used. The work that we do with Nonpareil is plainer than our cotemporary can do even if he used a four-line Pica face.

LIVE AND LET LIVE.

Our bid for doing the County printing was as low as any legitimate newspaper can afford to do it, if business principles are taken into consideration. In fact, it was too low to leave us a margin of profit, and were it not for the fact that some of the county work is of a quasi-news nature, and of interest to many of our readers, we could not afford to do it at the price we named. We believe in sound business methods and are always ready to enter into fair competition where merit wins, but do not like to compete with such "rats" on their starvation basis, though there is one consolation, such opposition will not last long. Our labor is worth just so much, and we want a sufficient remuneration for our work and productions just the same as any tradesman or artisan. The watchtower pays \$10 for the privilege of performing all this laborious work and gets nothing in return, except the satisfaction of keeping us from making a few dollars, and the pleasure of styling itself the official paper of Tillamook County. But, that will not buy bread. Our motto is "Live and let live."

NOT MISSIONARIES.

Our cotemporary states that he will do the county work and throw \$10 in for the sake of the good of the county and people. Now, we are not here for our health or to do missionary work, and will not attempt to disguise the fact that we are working for Lamb & Jones in particular. If the county and people derive any benefit from what we do without being paid for, we are glad of it, and they are welcome to it. We, of course, realize the fact that it is the duty of every newspaper to work in the interest of the people,

and we shall probably do as much for the community at large as any other newspaper in the county, and we feel gratified when we are encouraged in the work by a liberal support. But, don't think for a minute that we would stay here if it did not pay us to stay, or the future prospects did not justify it. We do not ask patronage or support just for the sake of having a paper in the county. We don't wish to take money from our subscribers or advertisers, if they do not feel that they are getting value for their money, and we do not wish to give out our paper or do work unless we receive what it is worth.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The King of Greece has announced his intention of abdicating in favor of his son, the Duke of Sparta.

A big gold find, reported to be the richest discovery in the world, has been struck near Tin Cup, Colorado.

The city of Fargo, North Dakota, was struck by a cyclone last Monday and a number of people killed and much property.

China proposes to exclude Americans from her territory on the same plan the Chinese are excluded from the United States. This may effect commerce in the Pacific coast cities to a small extent, but the prosperity of the people on the coast will not suffer.

Those people who are afraid of having too much money in the country are the ones who have got nearly all the money there is, and do not want other people to have the chance to improve their financial condition. There is no danger of too much money if it is good money, and the "dollars of our daddies" ought to be good enough for anybody.—Tacoma News.

Portland is having considerable trouble over her census. The Chamber of Commerce took the matter in hand and a special census agent was sent to the city. It was claimed that Portland, Albina and East Portland should make a showing of 80,000 inhabitants and that the result of the census just taken would fall short of that by 5,000 or 10,000. The special agent, however, thinks there is not much cause for complaint and has not yet decided to make a recount.

Before this town grows larger and property becomes more valuable, the county should purchase a large block of ground centrally located for a public square. It will not be many years until the courthouse and grounds now used will be utterly inadequate and provisions to obviate the difficulty should be made at once. The grounds could be set out to trees now and in a very few years, it would be an ornament to the town, besides saving the tax-payers money in the long run. The town could well afford to bear a part of the expense of purchasing a suitable location. The five-acre tract between Mrs. Hutchins' store and the school-house would be an excellent location, and should be secured before it is cut up into lots.

Arrangements should be made to establish a college at this place. No more suitable location could be found in the state, and many families from the Willamette valley would reside here during the summer months to school their children. If proper care is taken to beautify the town and secure a few attractions of this kind, Tillamook can be made a very desirable place for residences. Tillamook is bound to be an important business center, and by showing a little enterprise in due time, it can be made a social and educational center. It will also become a favorite pleasure resort. The climate, considering everything, is unexcelled; the location is beautiful; in time transportation facilities will be good, and the one thing necessary now, is a little enterprise.

Additional Locals.

The teacher's association will be held at Long Prairie on Saturday. R. R. Hays' real estate office will be in the building next door to the bank. Frank Linville is out of politics. The Democratic voice went out in like manner. As we go to press, the labors of the county court have not been finished. The extra time is taken up with the sheriff's books.

It is reported that another newspaper will be started in this place. Let it come; the more the merrier. Opposition has helped us, so far.

A weather vane representing a salmon has been placed on the cupola of the new school house. Nothing more appropriate could have been selected. The new fence around the school-house grounds adds much to the beauty of the place. The court-house should be enclosed by a neat fence and a walk built connecting it with the town.

Almost sufficient subscriptions for stock have been obtained to carry out the race-track and fair-ground project. It is proposed to buy forty acres of land of Ed. Morin, a mile and a quarter east of town, and make the track a half mile circle.

Nicholas Mitty was adjudged insane and sent to the asylum on Monday. His insanity is not of a vicious or dangerous character, and he labors under the idea that he is being persecuted by everybody. It is thought that proper treatment in the asylum will bring him around all right. He has been living on the Kilchis and has a family.

W. S. Runyon, has filed his bond with the county court and will now commence active operations in the construction of the Wilson River road. Mr. Runyon has purchased the outfit used by Smith in building the Washington county end of the road, and had it moved up to the summit where he will start about twenty-five men at clearing the right-of-way the first of next week, he expects to have another gang of men at work on this end by July 20th, and another mid-way between the two as soon as possible. The road goes through some very rough country, but Mr. Runyon says he will have it built and ready for this winter's travel, if practicable. It will be one of the best things for Tillamook county that we have had for years, as by that route we can get in or out at any and all seasons, the elevation not being enough for the road to be shut up by snow.

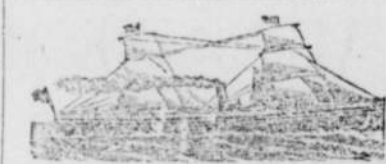
