WHERE THE COUNTY LOSES.

Last year the sheriff assessed a great deal of timber land to which no title has been acquired, and as a result many are refusing to pay taxes on such lands. In other cases assessments have been duplicated on the same piece of property, and by these means the footing of the assessments is made much greater than it should be.

Unless the county forces a collection in these cases, it not only loses the amount of the taxes but has to make good the state's share of these taxes. The county pays the state in cash according to the full assessed value of all taxable property in the county, whether the full amount of taxes are collected or not. If the county should collect only enough money to satisfy the state levy, it would be all the same.

We are in favor of having the collections strictly enforced, where ever the assessments are just and where the assessments are unjust, the corrections should be made or the fault remedied by the board of equalization.

TO EX-JUDGE COOPER.

It would be supposed that a man who has occupied the position of a county judge should be a man of some dignity and moderation in his manner and language. And it seems that occupying such a position would cause a man to assume some dignity, and temper his bigotry and dogmatism with prudence, though he be naturally impulsive or fickle-minded.

But Ex-Judge Cooper's letter is rather flippant and undignified, considering the source from which it emanates. We are surprised to see the Judge descend to write a letter abounding in attempts at common-place wit and coarse innuendo. We expected to see the Judge a little more refined in his literary taste.

WHAT ARE TIMBER LANDS.

In an opinion filed August 20th, in the United States circuit court at Tacoma, Judge Hanford decided in effect, that all timber lands in western Washington, except valley and bottom lands which are covered with alder, ash, cottonwood and maple, are subject to sale under the timber and stone act of June 3, 1878. If Judge Hanford's opinion were accepted as the law, there would be no difficulty in acquiring timber lands under this act, and the area subject to entry under the homestead and pre-emption laws might be much restricted. He says "that fir and cedar lands that cannot be worked or cultivated without expense, in

removing stumps and roots, greater than the land is worth for agricultural purposes, "is the character of land contemplated by this statute, and is as much subject to sale under its provisions, if situated in near proximity to navigable water or a farming community, or a city or railroad, as if it were in some remote, broken, rugged and mountainous region. To a person acquainted with this country, this class of lands is readily distinguished from the alder, bottom and valley lands, which are considered valuable for cultivation, as a forest is distinguished from a prairie.—Pioneer.

The action of the county court is rather queer in regard to building a new bridge across Wilson river near Mr. Freeman's place. It has been generally understood that the course of the road has been changed so that the bridge would be placed farther up the river so it would be of some use to people living further up the river. It looks as if it were an attempt to fix the road on the old route, regardless of the wishes of the people, and in the interest of somebody whose land would be crossed by the road. We should like to see the matter explained. Probably there should be a road maintained on the old route, but the new one would be no more expensive, just as short, and would accommodate a great many more people.

As a matter of law, if the decision of Judge Boise is sustained and Maxwell's suit dismissed upon the grounds of the unconstitutionality of the act, it will certainly have a pernicious bearing and be held to be almost conclusive in regard to the Wilson river road act.

Yamhill county is well supplied with newspapers, there being six all told. They are all live, enterprising papers, and the Telephone-Register and Reporter rank with the best local papers in the state.

The idea of a special session of the Oregon Press Association to further the interests of Oregon's exhibition at the world's fair, suggested by L. Samuel of the West Shore, is a good one.

The West Shore is making things merry for Governor Penney: on account of his injudicious appointments for commissioners for the world's fair.

The Oregonian has commenced operations on its new building. It will be eight stories in height and one of the best buildings on the coast.

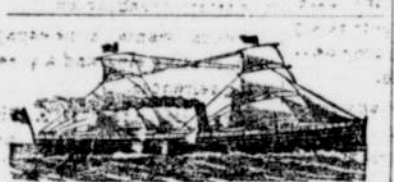

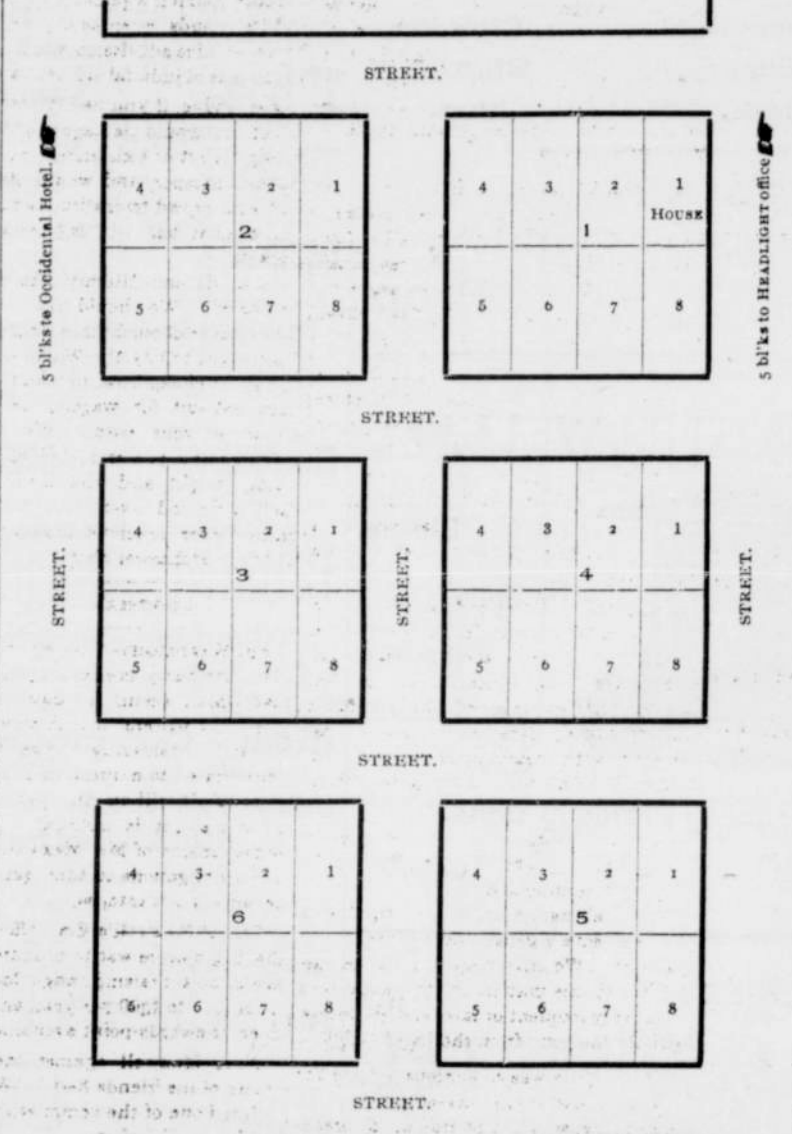
