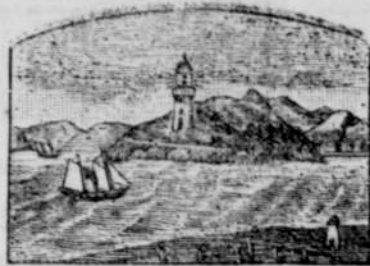

FROM WASHINGTON.

DOINGS OF OUR LAW-MAKERS.

An Interesting Budget of News from The
National Capital.-Pertinent
Comment.

[From our Regular Correspondent.]

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31, 1890.

Very little news, but a large amount of work, is about the political situation at the two congressional committee headquarters. The rush and general briskness which marks the beginning of the end is just setting in and the way campaign literature is being poured on the heads of a devoted people by both republicans and democrats is a solemn warning to tract disseminators. The republican headquarters was a lively place this morning. There were no Senators or Representatives around, but there were lots of people just the same. In the front room is a big table which an uninitiated citizen might take for a bargain counter in some book store. On it are strewn documents of all sorts, from the ponderous utterances of able statesmen on the tariff question to pretty little valentines containing on one side pictures of the snake-like trail of the gerrymander in Ohio and on the other the stars and strips with remarks about the G.O.P. being true to the flag. With this collection the rule is help yourself, and all day long people stand around this table and pick out documents and ammunition and picture cards and mail them to friends whom they think need reading matter. In the back room long lines of clerks are sending out documents of every description. At the democratic headquarters activity is also the order. Large quantities of the new democratic text book are being sent off, along with big consignments of Senator Carlisle's speech on the tariff. Little political news can be obtained at either headquarters. Both committees, of course, are keeping as well informed as possible on the situation in the doubtful districts, but it is rather early to commence to prophesy. So far, however, as can be learned everybody is happy and both parties are sure of success, both parties will have the next House and presidency, with the prohibitionists and Farmers' Alliance still to be heard from.

The anti-lottery law is increasing largely the correspondence of the Post Office Department. The provisions of the law are not evidently understood, and ever since Judge Tyner issued the instructions to the postmasters, which are practically a commentary upon the law, the inquiries continue to flow in. A few days ago a letter was received from the South in which the writer stated that a guessing contest had been organized with the intention of starting a fund for a home for confederate veterans. The authorities were asked if it was contrary to the new law to admit to the mails newspapers containing notices of such a contest. There are other schemes over which there is doubt, such as when newspapers offer prizes to persons receiving the largest number of votes. The question whether schemes of this character are prohibited by law has been referred to the Attorney General for his decision, and the department has made no rule pending this decision. The managers of fairs for various charitable purposes are apt to be annoyed when they find that their freedom in advertising their enterprises is considerably curtailed by the provisions of the law. It is not unusual to receive requests at the department that exception be

made in some particular case because the cause is a worthy one, but under the law this is impossible.

The count of the population of the country has been about completed by the Census Office. The chief of the population division, expects to have the count of the entire country completed in a few days. By the time Superintendent Porter gets back, and he is expected to arrive in this country on Thursday, the office will be about ready to issue a bulletin announcing the population of the forty-nine states and territories. The figures given in the last two census will be printed in parallel columns with the results obtained by the present census, so that a comparison can be made of the growth of the population of the various states during the past three decades.

It was the commonly accepted idea, for a day or two past, that the President is personally in favor of an extra session of Congress immediately after the November elections and that the only hitch in the arrangements arises from the strong objections to the plan which have been conveyed to the President from some of his closest political allies. The President, it is stated, is asking the opinion of republican congressmen when they call on him. It is even stated that the 15th of November is the proposed date for the calling of the intermediate session.

Maj. McKinley ought to secure a good non-partisan support for having increased the price of amateur photographer's outfits.

LEAKS ON A FARM.

The leaks in the roofs of the farm buildings are not all that many farmers have to contend with. We see many farmers buying high priced implements and when through with them for the season, leave them where they were last used, either in the furrow or in the stubble field, until wanted the next spring, and then lose valuable time in going to the shop for repairs, or what is worse, going to the store for new ones. Have a place or a shelter for every machine, and when the hired man or owner himself is through using it, put it in the place assigned for it. Some say it will take time. To be sure it does; but is it not better to have tools that are fit for use at any time than it is to stop the team when busy, to go to town to get them fixed, and thereby cause a leak in the pocket book?

Again, many will keep scrub stock and breed from them year after year because the owners of blooded stock ask too high a price for the service of their stock. Then, you may see, on riding through the country, dilapidated buildings, and the owner will say he is not able to repair them, but you will find on inquiry that he spends enough money for whiskey and tobacco to keep them in good repair.

Another leak is the hiring of cheap help, mere servants, and leaving them to do the work, while the proprietor is in town talking politics, or sitting on the fence discussing neighborhood gossip with some one as worthless as himself.

These are but some of the leaks that might be mentioned, for pages might be filled in enumerating the things both small and great, that keep the farmer plodding along always in debt and eternally growing about hard times.—Flowman.

STATE AND GENERAL NEWS.

Telegraphic Brevities and News Notes
Gleaned from our Exchanges.

The cost of publishing the new Tacoma charter was \$9094.

The Spokane registration shows the city to have 4300 voters.

At Olympia 1213 men registered as voters. In 1889, 334 votes were cast.

North Yakima has built two new school houses, for which it is in debt \$14,000.

Russian papers have accounts of the foundering off Cape St. Vincent of a steamer carrying 1000 Russian emigrants bound for Brazil.

The Whatcom Reveille complains of a corrupt jury in the criminal cases being tried there. It says it is impossible to get a conviction.

A German torpedo boat has been sent to the North sea to defend the German herring fleet from the encroachments of other fishermen.

An express train on the New York & New Haven railroad struck a party of men at work on a bridge near Lyme. Two civil engineers were killed.

Fire in George Wadman's brewery, Newport, Ky., Oct. 29, destroyed a warehouse containing 100,000 bushels of barley and malt. Loss, \$100,000; insured.

Speaker Reed was recently robbed of his purse while on his way to Chicago, and had no money to pay for his sleeping car berth. His embarrassment was relieved by the timely arrival of an acquaintance.

Vara Sonssalitz, the famous nihilist, whose adventures and hardships in connection with the nihilist Hartman, attracted to her worldwide attention and sympathy about ten years ago, is dying at Geneva.

Advice from Stanley, dated Aug. 31, report the ship St. Mary ashore August 16, and will be a total wreck. Arrangements had been made with two schooners to save the cargo.

Recently a Chicago policeman named Mahoney, who attempted to arrest highwaymen, was himself held up and robbed of his star, watch, club, revolver and a small amount of change.

It is stated that the revenue cutter Bear, which is now at Ounak, during her four or five weeks' cruise in Alaskan waters, found no poachers, and consequently made no seizures.

A wood-working factory has been located at Orting, Wash., and an electric light plant and a furniture factory are said to be among the coming industries of that town.

The first gold brick was turned out at the Ellensburg sampling works last week, from free milling ore taken from the Sauk gold mines, owned by the Seatons. The brick was eighteen fine, and was sent to the Spokane exposition.

The motor line company from Yaquina bay to Seal rocks and Alsea bay is getting in good shape to commence work early in the spring. The company intends to have the line ready for the summer travel.

A Meeting of the board of directors of the Oregon Pacific was held at Corvallis Monday, but nothing relative to the business transacted will be given to the public. Col. T. E. Hogg, the president of the road made a trip to Eugene Tuesday. He will visit Albany and other points before returning to New York.
