THE KILCHIS RIVER BOOM.

About one year ago a company was formed among our substantial local business men to boom Kilchis river. They made application to the county court to secure the franchise and were ready to give good and sufficient bonds for completing the work and stipulated that they would charge but 27c per thousand for booming logs.

Their application was refused, but at the last term of court, quietly and without notice or warning, a franchise was given to W. S. Runyon permitting him to collect 45c per thousand from those who wish to send logs down the river.

We do not blame Mr. Runyon for making a good bargain with the county court, but we blame the court for being so easily "bamboozled." Of course, we have no idea there was anything crooked about the transaction!

There is no doubt but what the county court is controlled by the same man that it was a year ago. In other words, we believe that Mr. Cooper is still the power behind the throne.

The law providing for booming rivers was originally intended to enable counties to improve the streams the same as public highways, but a provision was attached giving counties the privilege of leasing franchises to private parties.

Before a franchise is let the matter should be advertised and everybody given a chance, besides bonds should be required to insure loggers against loss, as a break in the booms on account of carelessness of a boom company, would likely cause great loss, and the county would be liable, unless the boom company is responsible.

The greatest of care should be exercised in granting such important franchises.

FEARFUL RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

A passenger train on the Southern Pacific fell through a trestle at Lake Labish near Salem on the night of November 11. There were about 150 passengers on the train, most of which were more or less injured. Three were killed instantly and one died the next day. A rail had been removed by train wreckers for reasons not understood, and there is no clue to the guilty parties. The train fell a distance of twenty feet and everything was mashed into "smithereens."
