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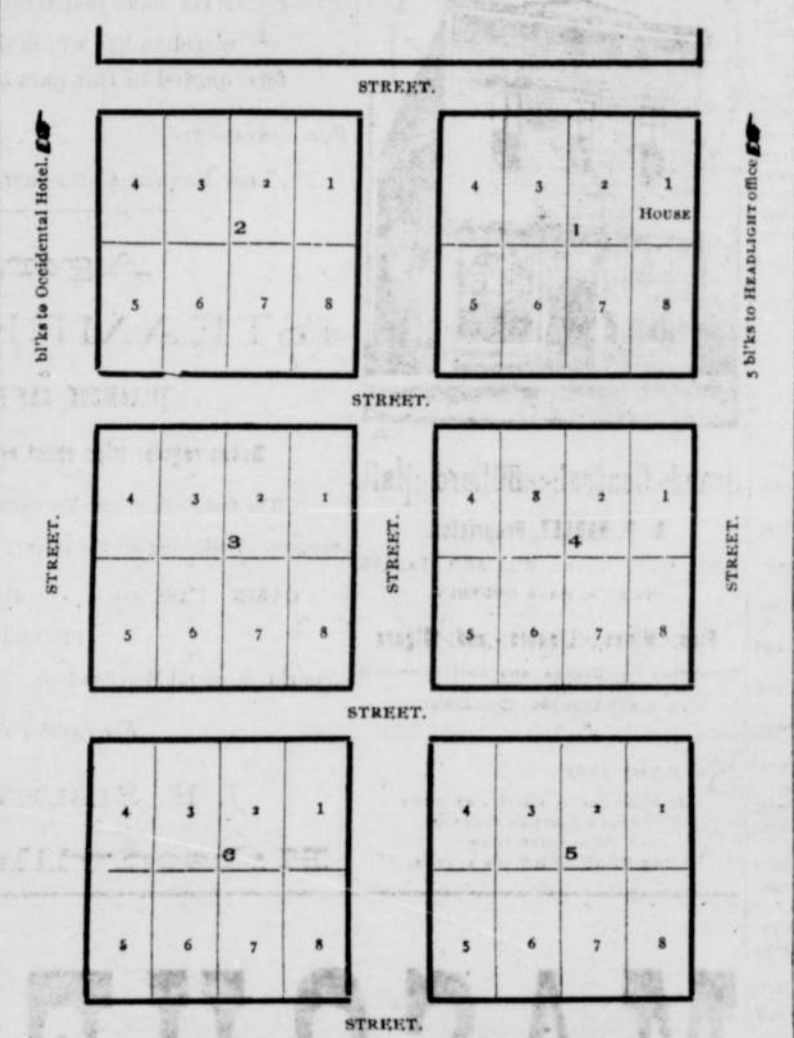

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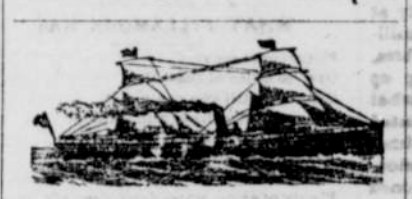

Cleopatra at the Fair.

A citizen of Alexandria, Egypt, named Alexander Tagliaferro, has written to the World's fair management including a photograph of a sarcophagus, which he believes and claims to be that of Cleopatra. He says it was recently discovered in Caesar's camp, near Alexandria. After paying the Egyptian government its dues the writer says he sold it to a friend for speculation. When the sarcophagus was opened the contents fell in ashes with the exception of the skeleton, which is still preserved. Mr. Tagliaferro says he is prompted to negotiate with the exposition authorities from notions which he has seen in newspapers of the United States announcing that the khedive of Egypt has been asked by the directors of the exposition for the mummy of Ramesses. He begs to offer for sale this sarcophagus and skeleton for the sum of £12,000 sterling on the spot, the inference being that the purchaser will be required to pay freight. In explaining the features of this tomb he states that the five faces on three sides are positively the images of Cleopatra.—Chicago Mail.

How to Keep Fish When Caught.

The angler should take care of his fish after he has caught them. It is disreputable to fetch back a lot of sun and wind dried fish, all curled up and stiff. Put a handful of grass or ferns in the bottom of the creel and kill the fish as soon as caught by hitting them a sharp blow on the back of the head. If the weather is hot clean the morning's catch at noon, and every few hours dip the creel in the stream. The best way to keep fish to take home is as follows: Clean them thoroughly, taking care to remove the gills and the blood under the backbone, wipe dry inside and out, but do not wash them; sprinkle them inside with black pepper; but on no account use salt. Pack in cool, fresh grass and keep them in the shade. If ice is used it should be put in a tin can, or at least at the bottom of the creel, for it spoils the flavor of fish to have them soaking in water.—Forest and Stream.

Fell a Hundred Feet.

We are now at the beginning of that season of the year when accidents to mountain tourists are unfortunately not of rare occurrence. Our Vienna correspondent telegraphs that a young Viennese ascended the Rex with two companions. After viewing the splendid sunrise the three young men, although without a guide, resolved to descend on the steep side of the mountain. At several places the descent is made by means of ladders, and at one of these spots the young man missed his footing and fell a distance of one hundred feet. He was killed on the spot.—London News.

Colorado's Mineral Palace.

The mineral palace now being erected in Pueblo, Colo., will cost about \$250,000. It will be of handsome design, the exterior being a series of square columns and beautifully polished stone. All parts of this building will be made of the products of Colorado's mines, the owners in all the counties in the state having sent in their choicest and richest specimens. In the interior will be seen every variety of mineral production from stone and coal to pure gold, the value of which will be at least \$750,000.
