**TO INSPECT THE LIGHTHOUSE.**

The lighthouse tender Manzanita succeeded in landing machinists on Tillamook rock Wednesday, to repair the boiler of the fog signal, and also landed enough provisions to last till she can visit the rock again. The tender is now working at the bays on the bar and at the mouth of the Columbia. After this is completed she will go down and fix up the bays between the Columbia and Cape Blanco. On Monday Captain W. W. Rhodes will start for Tillamook in company with A. J. Brownlie, to inspect the light on Cape Meares. He has received word that the mud is only a foot deep on the road across the Coast range, and thinks this is a very favorable time to make the trip, as when he last went over it was about three feet deep.

Among the crew will be the following Tillamookers: Joe and Sumner Hauxhurst, Wm. Newcomb, Harry Paine and "Dutch Fred" who left on the Str. Augusta, to join the ship at Astoria.

**FROM KANSAS.**

EL DORADO, KAN. ED. HEADLIGHT.—The people of Oregon, and more especially of Tillamook county, can congratulate themselves that they are who they are, where they are and what they are. It is true your country has its drawbacks but they are nothing when compared with the cold weather, sickness and hard times of some of your sister states. What would a Tillamook boy think, or how would he like to put in from ten to fifteen hours, in the cold, per day, at the rate of \$10 per month, or forty or fifty cents per day? Well that is what they are doing here, those that have work, but there are a great many that haven't got it, and cannot get it to do even at these wages. I have seen a great big country since I left home, but have seen no place that I prefer to that of Tillamook county. I have had a great many questions asked me in regard to that country, about 4,114 I think, or more. If the Oregon Immigration Bureau would give me about 1 1/2 cts. per head I could make good wages shipping immigrants.

construction of two bridges; and across the Nehalem river, at or near the mouth of Folley creek, and one across the Big Nestachee river, at or near the place where the County road, known as the Maxwell road now crosses the above named river.

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated out of the general fund of the State of Oregon, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of five thousand dollars for the purpose of constructing two bridges; one across the Nehalem river, at or near the mouth of Folley creek, in the north part of Tillamook county, and one across the Big Nestachee river at or near the place where the present county road, known as the Maxwell road now crosses the river.

Section 2. That the county court of Tillamook county shall have full and free supervision of the location and construction of said bridges, and that the said county court shall report to the Governor of the State of Oregon, setting forth their action concerning the construction of said bridges, and a full and explicit statement of the disposition of the funds hereby confined to their hands. Said report shall be made upon the completion of said bridges.

Section 3. The Secretary of State is hereby authorized to draw his warrant upon the State Treasurer, in favor of the county court of Tillamook county, for five thousand dollars for the purposes specified in section 1 of this Act.

Section 4. Inasmuch as it is for the benefit of the people of Tillamook county as well as a large number of people of the Willamette valley that the work on the bridges above named be completed as soon as possible, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the Governor.
