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(CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK.)

Section 9. All streets, roads, alleys, or public highways, either by water or land within the corporate limits of said city, shall be under the control and supervision of the board of trustees.

Section 10. The board of trustees shall have power and is authorized, whenever it deems it expedient, to improve the public grounds within said city; to establish and open streets and alleys within the limits of said city in continuation of those now or hereafter laid out; to establish or alter the grade and to improve any street or part thereof, now or hereafter laid out or established within the limits of said city. The power and authority to improve a street includes the power and authority to construct, improve, pave, repair and keep in repair the sidewalks and pavements, except for the temporary use or occupation thereof, during the erection or repair of a building upon the adjacent lot, or the removal thereof.

Section 11. And said city shall not, in any event, be liable in damages to any person for an injury caused by any defect or dangerous place at or in any sidewalk, cross-walk, street alley, bridge, public grounds, public buildings or ditch unless said city shall have had actual notice of such defect or dangerous place, and a reasonable time thereafter in which to repair or remove such defect or dangerous place before the happening of such accident or injury, and in no case shall more than fifty dollars be recovered as damages from the city for such an accident or injury.

Section 12. The board may, in its discretion, provide for the publication of any ordinance or ordinances after they shall have taken effect.

Section 13. Whenever the board of trustees of the city of Tillamook deems it expedient to improve a street or part thereof, it may proceed to ascertain and determine the probable cost of making such improvements, and assess upon each lot or part thereof adjacent to said proposed improvement liable therefor, its proportionate share of such costs.

Section 14. Whenever the probable costs of the proposed improvements have been ascertained and determined, and the proportionate share thereof of each lot or part thereof has been assessed, as provided for in section 13, the board must declare the same by ordinance and direct the city recorder to enter a statement thereof in the docket of the city liens, as provided in the next section.

Section 15. The docket of the city liens is a book in which must be entered, in pursuance of section 14, the following matters in relation to assessment for the improvement of streets: 1. The number or letter of the lot assessed, and the number or letter of the block in which it is situated; and if a separate assessment is made upon a part of a lot, a particular designation of such part. 2. The name of the owner thereof, or that the owner is unknown. 3. The sum assessed on such lot or part thereof, and the date of the entry.

Section 16. The docket of city liens is a public writing and the original or certified copies of any matter authorized to be entered therein are entitled to the force and effect thereof; and from the date of an entry therein of an assessment upon a lot or a part thereof, the sum so entered is to be deemed a tax levied and a lien thereon, which lien shall have priority over all other liens or incumbrances thereon whatever.

Section 17. For the purpose of ascertaining who is the owner of any lot or part thereof, or of any parcel of land other than a lot, assessed for the improvement of a street, the recorder shall take the certificate of the county clerk, of Tillamook county, stating who is the owner thereof at the date of the ordinance making the assessment, as may appear from the record of deeds of such county, which certificate such county clerk is authorized and required to give when demanded by the recorder.

Section 18. A sum of money assessed for the improvement of a street cannot be collected until, by order of the council, ten days' notice thereof is given by the recorder, by publication in a weekly or daily newspaper published in the city of Tillamook; provided, if no newspaper is published in said city, the recorder may give due and legal notice by posting notices in three of the most public places in the city; such notice must substantially contain the matter required to be entered in the docket of city liens concerning such assessment.

Section 19. If within five days from the final publication of the notice prescribed in section 18, the sum assessed upon any lot or part thereof is not wholly paid to the city treasurer and a duplicate receipt therefor filed with the recorder, the board may hereafter order a warrant for the collection of the same, to be issued by the recorder, directed to the city marshal or other person authorized to collect taxes due the city.

Section 20. Such warrant must require the person to whom it is directed to forthwith levy upon or part thereof upon which the assessment is unpaid, and sell the same in the manner provided by law and return the proceeds of such sale to the city treasurer, and the warrant to the recorder with his doings endorsed thereon, together with the receipt of the city treasurer for the proceeds of such sale as paid him.

Section 21. Such warrant shall have the force and effect of an execution against real property, and shall be executed in like manner, except as herein-after specially provided.

Section 22. The person executing such warrant shall immediately make a deed for the property sold thereon to the purchaser, stating therein that the same is made subject to redemption, as provided herein. Within three years from date of sale, the owner or his successor in interest, or any person having a lien by judgment, decree or mortgage on

made by the payment of the purchase money, from the date of the sale to time of redemption, at legal rate, and the amount of any tax which the purchaser may have paid upon the property.

Section 24. A redemption discharges the property from the effects of the sale upon the assessment. If made by the owner or his successor in interest, the estate in the property is thereby restored to such owner or his interest, as the case may be; but if made by a lien creditor, the amount paid for the redemption is thereafter to be deemed a part of his judgment, decree or mortgage, as the case may be; and shall bear like interest, and may be enforced and collected as a part thereof.

Section 25. Whenever a purchaser, or those claiming under him, refuse to convey to a person entitled to redeem, such person can enforce a conveyance thereof by a suit in equity, as for a specific contract to convey real property; and such suit may be maintained against absent parties without proof of tender of money and offer to redeem, if the plaintiff bring such.

Section 26. Whenever the board shall deem it for the interest of the city to open and lay out a street or alley, or extend those now or hereafter to be laid out, they shall declare the same by ordinance, to be published one month in some daily or weekly paper published in the city of Tillamook. The board, at its earliest convenience thereafter, or within six months of the final publication of such notice, shall appoint three disinterested freeholders, residents of the city, whose duty it shall be to proceed to assess and report to the board the damages to property owners on the line of the streets or alleys to be opened, laid out or extended; at the same time to determine what persons or property will be benefited by such improvements, and assess the damages and expenses in part or in whole thereof on the real estate benefited thereby in proportion, as near as may be to the benefits resulting to each. Such benefits, when determined and assessed, shall be a lien upon the property so benefited, and shall be docketed, proceeded with and collected in the same manner as assessments for street improvements.

Section 27. Each lot or part thereof within the limits of a street where a sidewalk is proposed to be built, or improved, or repaired, shall be liable for the full cost of making, improving or repairing the same in front of or abutting upon it, and also shall be liable for the cost, in whole or part, as the ward may determine, of making a proposed improvement upon the balance of the half street in front and also for a proportionate of one-half the cost of improving the intersection of two of the streets bounding in the block in which such lot or part thereof is situated.

Section 28. The cost, in whole or in part, as the board may determine, of improving such intersection is to be assessed upon the lots or parts thereof situated in the quarters of the four blocks and adjoining such intersection, but only upon the lots or parts thereof within the quarters nearest thereto, and in proportion to the cash value of such lots or parts thereof of respective of improvements thereon.

Section 29. A sale of real property herein as provided conveys to the purchaser, subject to redemption as herein provided, all the estate or interest therein of the owner, whether known or unknown, together with all the rights and appurtenances thereunto belonging.

Section 30. When assessment upon any lot or part thereof becomes delinquent any person having a lien thereon by judgment, decree or mortgage may at any time before the sale of such lot or part thereof pay the same to the city treasurer, taking duplicate receipts therefor, one of which shall be filed with the recorder, and such payment and filing of duplicate receipt with the recorder discharges the property from the effect of the assessment; and the amount of such delinquent taxes and all accruing costs and charges, if any, when so paid is thereafter to be deemed a part of such lien creditor's judgment, decree or mortgage, as the case may be, and shall bear like interest and may be enforced and collected as part thereof.

Section 31. The board must provide by ordinance for the time and manner of doing the work on any proposed improvement.

Section 32. If, upon the completion of any improvement or repairs, it is found that the sum assessed therefor upon any lot or part thereof is insufficient to defray the cost thereof, as contemplated herein, the board must ascertain the deficit and declare the same by ordinance; when so declared the recorder must enter the sum of the deficit in the docket of city liens in a column reserved for that purpose in the original entry, with the date thereof, and such deficits shall thereafter be a lien upon such lot or part thereof in like manner and with like effect as in case of the sum originally assessed, and shall also be payable and may be collected in like manner and with like effect as in the case of such sum originally assessed.

Section 33. If, upon the completion of any improvements or repairs, it is found that the sum assessed therefor upon any lot or part thereof is more than sufficient to defray the cost thereof as herein contemplated, the board must ascertain and declare the surplus in a like manner as in case of a deficit; when so declared it must be entered as in case of deficit in the docket of city liens, and thereafter the person who paid such surplus, or his legal representative, is entitled to repayment of the same by warrant on the city treasurer.

Section 34. To construct, repair and regulate sewers and drains either wholly at the expense of the city or partly at the expense of the owners of the adjacent lots, and to prescribe the manner in which sewers and drains shall be constructed and regulated, provided, that no order shall be made for the construction of a sewer except upon petition being

benefited hereby, and at least one-fifth of the cost of every such improvement, inclusive of the costs of the intersections of streets, shall be paid out of the city treasury.
