THE CANDIDATES.

The men named for the city offices at the citizens' meeting are all good men and the affairs of the newly created city government will be in good hands if they are all elected, which they probably will be next Monday.

C. N. DREW, for Recorder, is qualified in every respect for that office and deserves to be honored by being elected as first Recorder of Tillamook.

E. E. SELPH, is a successful attorney who always minds his own business. His nomination for city attorney was not sought for and was unexpected by him.

GEO. COHN, for Treasurer, is one of the solid business men of the town. He is thoroughly reliable and his integrity cannot be questioned.

FRANK LINVILLE will make an excellent city Marshall. Wrong-doers will respect his authority without question, and he is just the man to have charge of street improvements.

A. P. WILSON for Trustee is a man of excellent executive ability and the city can not well afford to do without his services as a member of the board.

JOHN SHEETS is a respected citizen of the town and is enterprising and progressive in his ideas. Mr. Sheets will be an excellent man for one of the Trustees.

JOHN BARKER is alright. No better man could have been selected to help formulate the ordinances of the first city government.

### PRE-EMPTION LAW REPEALED.

Commissioner Groff of the general land office has sent all land offices the following telegram:

"Pre-emption and timber culture laws repealed. Allow no further entries thereunder in claims hereafter initiated."

State of associated names was

already used their homestead rights and will lose their land with all improvements, unless there is some provision for those who have made actual settlement. Probably two-hundred settlers in this county will be affected by the repeal, yet most of them are residing on their claims and have made application for a survey. In some instances the parties have made valuable improvements and resided on their claims for several years.

There are many other changes made in the land laws and it will be some time before rulings and orders will be made that will make the changes understood. The commutation clause has been changed so that 14 month's residence is required and a payment of \$1.25 per acre. Those who have timber culture claims can secure title at the end of four years' compliance with the law by paying \$1.25 per acre. Those who have already made filings are, of course, all right.

More definite orders and rulings are awaited with great anxiety by the people of this section.

### THE NEW ELECTION LAWS.

According to the new election laws of Oregon each precinct shall contain not more than 250 voters. Polls will be open from 8 to 6. Not more than ten voters are permitted to approach within fifty feet of the polls at once. Nominations must be certified to by conventions and candidates must file acceptance. The ballots are furnished by the county clerk and must be alike, the names of all candidates appearing thereon, and those not voted for are to be stricken out, for which purpose the state furnishes indelible pencils. There will be a stall or private compartment for every forty voters, every voting place to have as many as three such places with a shelf or table where voters may prepare their ballots in secrecy. Those who cannot read or write will have the assistance of two judges. Attempts to violate the secrecy are punishable by fines from \$50 to \$500, and fraudulent voting by fines from \$300 to \$2,000 or imprisonment from one to three years, or both.

In cities of 2,500 inhabitants or over, political primaries are regulated by law, and fraud is punishable by fines of \$50 to \$200 and imprisonment.

The secretary of state will send out copies of the election laws in pamphlet form for the use of judges of elections.

A correspondent in the Watchtower concludes that the HEADLIGHT has changed its policy regarding the factional fight. Not much! This paper never engaged in a factional fight—it discouraged it and resented the methods used by the late faction. Of course we shall continue to ignore some of the foolish breaks made by certain elements, but the principles we advocated are good yet and we shall not relent until they are firmly established. Our efforts have never been directed towards tearing down and besmirching men's characters, but on the other hand, in building up and defending those who were unjustly assailed. We are, however, glad to see the feeling of remorse and retribution that has lately taken possession of the Watchtower, and would extend congratulations, were it not so evident to everyone what the apparent truce means.

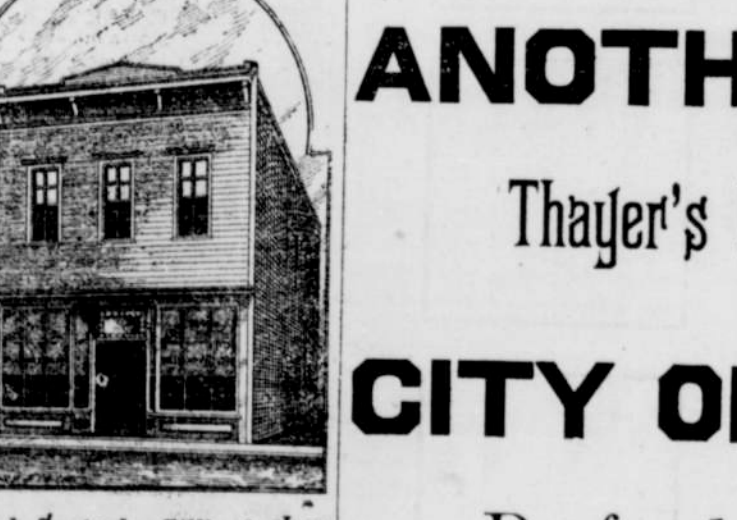
