It is the idea of many that the city should build a structure that will accommodate the Hook and Ladder Company, afford room for the city offices and three or four cells for a city calaboose. Such a building as is contemplated would cost but a few hundred dollars and would be a great saving in the long run.

Oregon has one chance left for representation at the World's Fair. No doubt California or Washington will allow her to join one of their border counties at the great exposition. How would it look to see Oregon's lay-out pinned onto the Sky-kiy county exhibit? Or, if that appears out of proportion, Oregon might go as an annex of little Wahkiakum county, which is fortunate enough to be situated on the north side of the Columbia river.

The Humboldt and Mendocino red-wood lumber dealers are cutting prices.

The prospects for the lumbering interests in the Pacific North West are growing brighter every day.

The Wealth of the North West, published at Tacoma, is a first-class journal, devoted to lumbering interests in the North West.

There are no finer bodies of timber in the North West than are found on the Nehalem river and on the affluents of Tillamook bay. These forests are very extensive.

There is a fortune awaiting for the man who invents some practical method of protecting piling from the terebrator. Stone wharves will come into general use on this coast soon unless some effective remedy is found.

Our total forest area, not including Alaska, is estimated at 490,000,000 acres. The total annual consumption, according to government statistics, is 20,000,000,000 cubic feet.—Puget Sound Lumberman.

Sharpeners in the East are engaged in working swindlers on Pacific coast timber lands. They generally claim to represent some lumbercompany with a high-sounding name, and manage to relieve each of their victims of \$25 to \$50 by promising to locate them on land for the alleged company.

The lumbermen of Tacoma have got together again in local combination and will try to hold prices up to a point a notch higher than they have been ruling for some time. An inspector will be appointed whose duty will be to inspect the books of the members of the association to see that each and all play fair. No central office will be maintained and each member is free to get all the trade he can at the prices agreed upon.—Wealth of the North West.

What with buying timber land by having henchmen locate on it, the timbered lands of Western Washington are largely passing into the hands of eastern syndicates, the number of whom are operating in this county is surprising and their representatives are run across every day, buying up everything in sight. Of course the largest and best tracts were grabbed up by the mill companies years ago, and are not for sale.—Wasco County Journal.

In logging, stumpage means pay-so much per 1000 feet for the timber on the land. In the various parts of the world, the price of standing timber sold to the loggers differs much. Here in Western Washington, timber is held at 60 to 80 cents per 1000 feet, or at \$10 to \$30 per acre, according to the location. A good rich timber claim directly near some such outlet as a deep stream or a railroad is a bonanza. It is hardly necessary to say that the bonanzas are not now plentiful, but this fact seems to have little effect upon the increasing number of woodsmen ever seeking them. At last the number of timber land notices published in the newspapers is on the decline. This is at once suggestive; the timber land thus far surveyed is getting to be pretty well appropriated. Nothing suffers more, because of this, than the country weekly, for which the publication of the final proof is a source of great revenue.—Aberdeen Herald.
