Some in those days would put on board the schooner a few hundred pounds of butter to exchange for flour and groceries, and the schooner would get loaded off to Puget Sound and be gone three or four months and the best of us had to do without bread. We used salmon and potatoes straight until spring. Woolen-breeches were the first to come up, and by the way are not a bad dish. The name would imply it was a rather rough diet, but cooked right it is "powerful good."

We shall never see those days again. Civilization is invading the country and some put their boys in boots and shoes during the winter. I visited the school the other day and more than half the boys had boots or shoes on and all the girls so far as I could see. We are having new school house all over the country and churches are being built, and plug hats can be seen on the streets every fine day, and we have a bank whose drafts are honored in New York, Chicago and all the principal cities of the United States, and this little kingdom of Tillamook is not to be despised any longer.

HOUSE BILL No. 121. [Introduced by Hon. Wm. D. Stillwell.] A bill for an act entitled an act to amend section 2590 of the Miscellaneous Laws of Oregon, as compiled and annotated by W. Lair Hill, being a part of title 3, chapter 16, relating to education: Section 1. That the part of the eighth clause of section 25, title 3, which reads: "Certificates of the first grades shall not be issued to persons under eighteen years of age, nor to such as have not taught at least twelve school months with approved success," shall read as follows: Certificates of the first grade shall not be issued to persons under eighteen years of age, nor to such as have not taught at least twelve school months with approved success in the State of Oregon, or in other States.

Section 2. That that part of the ninth clause of section 25, title 3, which reads as follows: "Temporary certificates or permits may be granted by the county superintendent in case of necessity," shall have inserted after the word "necessity" the following words: Upon the presentation by the applicant for said permit, a certificate, either by mail, or in person, or otherwise, which certificate is then not expired, and which may have been issued in any county of this State, or of any other State.

SETTLER'S LEAGUE. The settlers on the unsurveyed lands on the North Nehalem held a well attended public meeting at the residence of J. W. Nelson, Jan. 19, and organized "The North Nehalem Settlers Union" with J. W. Nelson, President; M. Buchanan, Secretary and W. Becker, F. Jensen and Geo. Luce, Executive Committee. The objects of this society are, the protection of its members in their homes against claim-jumpers, trespassers, etc., and the aiding of its members in holding and proving up on their claims. This aid is to be given within the bounds of law and conscience.

The Benefits that Would be Derived from the Establishment of a Board of Trade in Tillamook. (WASHINGTON, D.C., JAN. 20, 1891.) Messrs. LAMB & JONES: Yesterday I received a copy of your New Year's edition of the HEADLIGHT, and I cannot refrain from sitting down this evening and sending you a few words of congratulation on the paper's neat and tasty appearance. It is just such a paper as this which favorably impress an outsider with a place of which he has heard and of which he knows nothing. Had your paper contained twelve or sixteen pages I should probably have just glanced it over and then laid it aside until I had more time to carefully look it over, and very likely this "time" would never come, or if it did come at all the paper would have been forgotten. As it is now, with your four-page paper, containing everything in a nut-shell, as the saying is, I have read it through carefully and with a great deal of interest, and I must admit that I am well pleased with Tillamook as you present its advantages and prospects to the public. I don't know whether your business men ordered extra copies or not, if not they made a big mistake. I would give more for the utterances of a local paper than I would for a boat load of convincing arguments by a real estate agent, and in this particular I do not see why I should reason different from other men. The point is just this, in your paper you make a statement, and if it is incorrect, your home readers know it and they lose confidence in you and in a very short time you find your business gradually slipping away from you, and if a publisher doesn't get good support his paper soon bears the car marks. So when I receive a copy of a well-printed, well-edited and neatly-made-up paper, such as yours of the 1st of January, I feel that I am reading something reliable and something that the home business men endorse by having their names and businesses represented by nicely-displayed business cards. A real estate agent on the other hand can write what he pleases and no one sees it but the person to whom he is writing, and as that person is a stranger often, he is entirely at the mercy of the agent, unless he can get to see the local paper, and if the agent is disposed to be dishonest his customer is going to get left if he invests with him. Do not understand me as saying that all agents are dishonest, but some of them undoubtedly are, and so I prefer to trust to the newspaper, and if I find an agent well spoken of in its columns or find one with a good advertisement there, showing that he is enterprising enough to give his paper support, I feel that I can trust him, and will do so until something happens to destroy that confidence.

I have looked over the columns of the paper referred to for indication that you have in Tillamook an organization of business men—such as a Chamber of Commerce or a Board of Trade—but can find nothing of the kind. If you are still lacking, such an organization as this, you should begin advocating the formation at once, for when all the business men of a place unite in an appeal for legislation it has far more weight than when they work as individuals. Also, if a man comes along looking for a site for a manufacturing plant he can be handled a great deal better by an association of this kind than by individuals—particularly if he comes as a location, water-power or rebate of taxes for a few years until he can get a good start. Men are very apt to ask for something of this kind, and if he sizes up as a desirable acquisition to the place, and is not to hogish in his demands he can often be captured by united and wise action of the leading men of the place. The Chamber of Commerce of Duluth, Minnesota, is supported by a half-mill tax on the valuation, and there is not a better advertised city in the United States. If a local paper gets out a particularly good edition—such as your issue of the 1st inst.—an order is immediately given for as large a number of copies as is wanted—usually ten to twenty thousand—and they are sent where it is thought it will do the most good. By this arrangement every property owner helps to bear the expense of advertising the place, and as new people come and invest their money and thus build up the place his property naturally increases in value and he thus more than gets his return for money invested in this way. As I said above, I am much pleased with Tillamook as you picture it, and before the year 1891 is completed hope to have a few hundred dollars invested there in some near-by acre property. A. E.
