Portland's new Democratic daily is to be called the Tribune, and is to appear about May 1st.

The Louisiana Lottery Company has a branch office in Mexico, and thus manages to evade the laws of the United States.

An eastern paper suggests that seats in the Senate be sold openly to the highest bidder and the receipts devoted to the public welfare.

The Salem Statesman was forty years old last week, there being no other paper in the state except the Oregonian, which is a few weeks its senior.

The cultivation of sugar beets is being extensively engaged in by California farmers, and there is no reason why the same industry cannot be made a success in this state.

If a poor tramp had committed such a murder as Sandy Olds was guilty of he would have been hung without delay, instead of being treated to a one year sentence in the state prison. Money, though furnished by gamblers, is a potent factor in the criminal courts.

Oregon had just as well try to raise the amount of taxes needed by contribution as by the present taxation system. The exemption law makes it possible for property holders to pay only what they see fit. If Oregon is represented at the World's Fair, it will be the result of contribution, and if those who will receive the most benefit from the World's Fair will show the proper spirit, the state will be represented yet in a creditable manner, notwithstanding the failure of the legislature to make necessary provisions. The failure of the reform taxation law made it impracticable to be liberal with appropriations, as high taxes with the present system would soon be disastrous to the financial condition of the state.

Multnomah Lodge No. 1, opened for the first time at Oregon City, September 11, 1848. At that time Jos. N. Hull, still living and residing near Sacramento, Cal., conferred the first degree on Christopher Taylor, of Dayton, Yamhill county.—Astorian.

The Supreme Court has granted a rehearing in the case of Governor Pio Pico against B. Cohn. The Supreme Court recently handed down an opinion in favor of Cohn, by which he was awarded about \$1,000,000 worth of property, and the last Mexican Governor of California was left a pauper in the 90th year of his life. The matter will be argued on the appeal now before the higher court.—Ontario (Cal.) Record.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)
WASHINGTON, D. C.,
March 23, 1891.

Ed. HEADLIGHT:—The publication of the statement that the President has decided to abandon his western trip on account of the pressure of public business is said at the White House to be premature and without foundation.

Private Secretary Halford said to your correspondent:

"The President wants to go, of course, but there is such a thing as public business that must be attended to, and which may prevent. Yes, there is an unusual pressure of matters just now. The Bering sea matter is the most important. The sealing season is about to begin, and in case the proposition hinted at in Lord Salisbury's last note as to arbitration should be agreed to, it would be quite essential that the President should be on hand to be consulted in the case. Then there are the land-claim court judges to be selected and the new circuit judges and various smaller matters that may tend to swell the amount of work. There is always something for the President to do—indeed plenty to do. If he can go, he will go, and if he cannot, he will not. That is all. I would hesitate to predict what he will be able to do."—L.
