The Sheriff made a careful search in prisoner Otis Howell's cell the other day and made some rather peculiar discoveries. He found secreted in the cell, a small saw-handle, and a small vise, such as are used for sharpening saws. The saw-blades could not be found at the time, though a more thorough search will probably find them. It is evident somebody has been supplying the prisoner with means to saw the bars and escape, and it may have been the man who stole the money. Mr. Steinhilber has been very careful in guarding the prisoner, but will exercise greater precaution hereafter. He will be removed into the next cell, and searched more frequently. It would be a very easy matter for an outsider to liberate the prisoner, as no one sleeps in the courthouse, and a few minutes work with a hammer and chisel would do the work.

THE BOARD OF TRADE.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trade occurred on Saturday with a good attendance. Several matters of importance were considered, and as the organization is getting in good working order, some definite and practical work will be done soon. Much good has already been accomplished, and it is becoming apparent that the institution will be of great benefit to the city and county.

It was considered that a large advertisement in the Oregonian would be too expensive at present, but arrangements will be made at once to advertise the city extensively by some means, and furnish descriptive printed matter to inquirers.

Efforts are being made to secure the establishment of mills, sash and door factories, and creameries here, and some important proceedings regarding roads will be instituted. Arrangements will be made to give good lots to settlers who will come here and build.

The Board then adjourned until Saturday, April 17, and in the meantime efforts will be made to increase the membership of the association. The citizens of the city and many good substantial men from the country are taking an active interest in the matter and are going to work

We would most earnestly urge upon the boards of trade of each county, and all good citizens, to co-operate with and act in conjunction with each other in securing the proper representation to attend the said meeting, so that each section of the state may assist in determining the best means to secure the object and purpose of this call.

The people of Oregon must move in this matter if they desire to keep up with the procession of other Pacific coast states. "Let Oregon be there, also."
