## A SPLENDID PROGRAMME SUITABLE FOR PUBLIC EXERCISES ON WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY.

How the Light of Reason May Be Thrown on Various Incidents in the Career of the Father of His Country. Choice Selections.

[Copyright by American Press Association.] The celebration of Washington's Birthday, even more than Fourth of July, is a national holiday, because it is a more solemn and dignified memorial day. It is as fitting an occasion for public exercises as "the glorious Fourth," and should inspire old as well as young orators.

The next tableau represents the surrender of Cornwallis to Washington. The two generals stand in the center of the stage, the former handing his sword to the latter, who stretches out his hand to take it. If there were soldiers in the second tableau let the same stand grouped about in this one. The following may be recited:

He fought, but not with love of strife he struck but to defend, And ere he turned a people's foe he sought to be their friend. He strove to keep his country's right by reason's gentle word, And when he fell in justice threw the challenge—sword to sword.

He stood the firm, the calm, the wise, the patriot and sage. He showed no deep avenging hate, no burst of despot rage. He stood for liberty and truth, and damnable lies he stood on. Till shouts of victory gave forth the name of Washington.

The fourth tableau shows Washington taking the oath as president of the United States. It will be impossible to represent this scene as it occurred, but the central figures can be made effective if surroundings are not exact, and it may be accompanied by martial or national airs if there be an orchestra. The recitation of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" will be suitable here.

On ye uncrowned but kindly kings, Made royal by the brain and heart; Of all earth's wealth the noblest part, Yet reckon naught in the market—All hail to you, most kindly kings!

"American heirs to a vast fortune in Europe—money in the Bank of England, etc." These words have become a "cheat" to the advertisements are usually by men who seek to defraud. Nevertheless it does occasionally happen that administrators have to cross the ocean for heirs, though in the majority of cases since the civil war they have been foreign heirs to fortunes made in America.

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A very real and very interesting case is that of the Alphonse Molere estate, of which Dr. J. W. Molere, of Enter street, San Francisco, appears to be a principal heir. The family is old and honorable. The doctor's grandfather, Jean Molere, was one of the great Napoleon's soldiers, and soon after Waterloo settled in Virginia. This son, born in Leesburg, was one of the founders of Fremont, O., and his son is the doctor.

One of the old soldier's brothers, as claimed, was the father of Alphonse Molere, who inherited \$350,000, and invested it just before the great rise in values some fifty years ago. He was consequently worth a round million dollars when he visited this country in 1868, remaining some years. Returning to France he became a great money lender and a miser, and recently died in a miserably furnished garret in a tenement. Among his papers was found a bank book showing deposits and securities to the value of \$1,300,000, and he owned considerable other property. So all the heirs will receive liberally, and Dr. Molere will be made quite wealthy.

A New Style of Door. Space is tremendously valuable in big cities, and it is one reason why fifteen story buildings are up on seventy-five foot lots. Not content, however, with solving the problem of tall structures, architects are busy devising means to economize the room within the walls. Among other things they have planned a door which is an adaptation of the principle of the roller top deck and cover. When the door is opened it is wound upon a spiral drum at top and bottom, and all is enclosed within the door casing. A three foot door winds up in a roll of seven inches diameter.

To Bore Through the Air. Mr. Allan, a resident of Seattle, Wash., is at present engaged in perfecting a flying machine. The cigar shaped framework is to be 100 feet in length. About it will be a worm of silk filled with gas. The worm will form the thread of a screw ten feet in diameter at the center, and tapering at either end. A cabin in the frame, suspended from the axle, will be the source of the "power" which is to cause the screw to revolve and bore its way through the air. One man only is to occupy the cabin. Passengers will be carried in a basket suspended below the frame by four ropes. A complicated steering apparatus will control the course of the machine. Mr. Allan is confident that his invention will be "a go" when put to the test. That, however, is a matter that only the future can decide.
