The people of Tillamook City do ordain:
That the regular meetings of the board of trustees shall be held at the Council Chamber on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of each month, at the hour of 7 o'clock p. m. And that a majority of the Board present shall constitute a quorum.
Approved March 20, 1891.

ORDINANCE NO. 2.
AN ORDINANCE TO DEFINE CRIMES AND MISDEMEANORS AND FIX THE PENALTIES FOR THE COMMISSION OF THE SAME.
The people of Tillamook City do ordain:
Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed, about his person, in any manner whatever, in Tillamook City, any revolver, pistol or other firearms, or knife, other than an ordinary pocket-knife, or any dirk or dagger, slug-shot or brass knuckles or any instrument by the use of which injury could be inflicted upon the property or persons of any other person.
Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of Sec. 1, of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, and cost, and in default of payment of such fines and cost shall be committed to the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and cost until such fine and cost are paid. But this section shall not apply to peace officers.
Sec. 3. If any person or persons shall in the corporate limits of Tillamook City be guilty of any riotous or disorderly conduct or fighting, or shall be upon any street or public place in said Tillamook City in an intoxicated condition, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder of said Tillamook City, shall be punished by a fine, of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 and costs, and in default of the payment of such fine and cost, shall be committed unto the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and cost until paid.
Sec. 4. If any person or persons while in the corporate limits of Tillamook City shall willfully ride or drive any horse or mule upon any side-walk therein, or shall willfully ride or drive any horse or mule through any street of said Tillamook City at a greater speed than six miles per hour or shall use any profane language in any public place in said city, or shall use any boisterous language to the disturbance of the peace of anyone, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00 and cost, and shall be committed, in default of the payment of such fine and cost, to the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and cost until such fine and cost are paid.
Sec. 5. If any person or persons shall within the corporate limits of Tillamook City have in his or her possession any beam-shooter, sling, bow and arrow, dart or any other device by the use of which may do injury to person or property of any other or shall discharge any gun, revolver, or pistol, or any other firearms within said limits of Tillamook City, shall upon conviction before the Recorder be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 and cost, and in default of the payment of such fine and cost, shall be committed to the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and cost, until such fine and cost are paid.
Sec. 6. If any person or persons shall within the corporate limits of Tillamook City willfully disturb, interrupt or disquiet any assembly or congregation, met for the purpose of public worship, either in a house or in open air, whether said meeting or assembly be for pleasure or any other lawful purpose, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder shall be punished by fine not less than \$5.00 or more than \$50.00.
Sec. 7. That any misdemeanor which is defined and made punishable by the law of the State of Oregon other than is mentioned in this ordinance, shall be deemed a misdemeanor and punishable by this ordinance, if any such misdemeanor shall be committed within the corporate limits of Tillamook City, and in the arrest and mode of proceedings in all such cases the Recorder shall be governed by the laws of the State of Oregon applicable to Justices of the Peace and the punishment therein provided for shall be the punishment for the same offense if committed within the corporate limits of Tillamook City, except that when imprisonment is necessary the Recorder shall commit all persons convicted before him to the city jail and the city marshal shall be governed by the laws applicable to a constable of the State.
Sec. 8. Any person convicted of any misdemeanor made punishable by this ordinance, and shall refuse to pay such fine and costs as herein provided shall be by the Recorder committed to the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and costs.
Sec. 9. In the discharge of their duties under this ordinance the Recorder and Marshall shall in such case be governed as near as possible in their mode of procedure and the enforcement of their lawfully demands and penalties herein provided for by the laws of this State applicable to justice courts.
Approved April 6th, 1891.

ORDINANCE NO. 3.
TO PROHIBIT MINORS FROM BEING OR LOITERING ON THE STREETS OF TILLAMOOK CITY.
The people of Tillamook City do ordain:
Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of 21 years, to be upon the public streets in Tillamook City between the hours of 10 o'clock p. m. and 4 o'clock a. m., from May 1st to December 1st, and any public place, unless upon an errand or other legitimate business for his or her parents or guardians, but in no case during such time shall such minor loiter upon any street in said Tillamook City.
Sec. 2. Any minor offending or violating the provision of the first section of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$20.00, and in default of the payment of such fine the person so convicted shall be committed to the city jail, not less than one nor more than five days.
Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to see that the provisions of this ordinance are enforced and make arrests of all minors violating this ordinance either upon warrants issued by the Recorder or without warrants in such cases as when the offense may have been committed in his presence.

INDIAN DEPREDAATION CLAIMS.
Just before adjournment Congress passed an Indian Depredation law that will probably put \$50,000,000 in circulation. This law practically removes all restrictions and limitations, and every settler or his heirs can now get pay in full for all losses occasioned by Indians. Henry N. Copp, the well known lawyer of Washington, D. C., will send free of cost a copy of this law to all who will apply to him for the same.

OTTIS HOWELL.
When Sheriff Steinbiller went to the jail to feed his prisoner Wednesday morning he found the bird had flown. The cell door had been unlocked, and the cell door either forced open or unlocked, the lock being gone. An axe was found at the cell door, but there were no signs that would indicate the door had been battered. It is thought by many that the man who liberated the prisoner is the same man who stole the money two weeks ago.
No effort has been made to recapture the prisoner and there is a general feeling that his departure is a good thing.

TAXES.
It is time all taxes are paid, and Deputy Sheriff Steinbiller is going to comply with the law and fulfill his duty in regard to the same. The law makes provision that the sheriff must sell property sufficient to pay all delinquent taxes, and in doing his duty he has no choice about the matter, but must comply with the law, regardless of consequences. All good citizens will approve of this course on the part of the sheriff, as the delinquent taxes collected will lessen the county debt and make taxes lighter for those who are in the habit of paying. We give one or two abstracts from the Code of Oregon which treat pointedly of this matter:
§ 2814. "It shall be the duty of the county clerk of each county, after the return of delinquent taxes as made by the sheriff thereof on the first Monday of April of each year, within ten days thereafter, to make from said delinquent tax roll a true and correct list of the taxes returned as unpaid, and a correct description of the lands or town lots, if the same can be made, and to whom such taxes are charged, and deliver the same to the sheriff of the county, with a warrant attached thereto, under his hand and the seal of the county court, in the name of the State of Oregon, commanding said sheriff to levy upon the goods and chattels of such delinquent taxpayer, and if none be found, then upon the real property as set forth in said tax list, or so much thereof as shall satisfy the amount of taxes so charged, with costs and expenses and that said sheriff be required to pay over all moneys so collected by the first Monday in July thereafter."
