OR TILLAMOOK CITY. The people of Tillamook City do ordain: That it shall be unlawful for any dog or slut to be upon any street of Tillamook City at any time unless the owner of such dog or slut shall obtain from the Recorder of said city, as herein after provided, a license for said dog or slut, and any person who shall be the owner of any slut, who shall allow said slut to be upon any street in said city, whether said owner has received a license for said slut or not as hereinafter provided, while such slut shall be in heat or season, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof before the Recorder shall be punished by a fine, not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00, and costs, and in default of the payment of such fine and cost, the person so convicted shall be committed to the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and cost, and the Marshall shall proceed to take up such slut in the manner hereinafter provided for the taking up of dogs, running and being upon any public street of said city, which has not been licensed. Sec. 2. Any person within said city wishing to procure a license for the keeping of any dog or slut in said city shall before obtaining the same apply to the Recorder for such license, giving an accurate description of his or her dog, which the Recorder shall enter into a blank book kept for that purpose, and shall pay to the Recorder the sum of one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50), and such person shall be entitled to receive from the Recorder a tag which shall be numbered and the Recorder shall keep a record showing to whom license has been issued with number of tag. Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of all persons procuring such licenses as herein before provided, to securely fasten said tag to the dog's neck for which said license may have been obtained, by a string collar, which shall be the evidence that such dog is licensed and such license shall only be good for one year from the date of issue, and the person so applying for such license shall receive a certificate when the tag is given showing that such dog is licensed for one year. Sec. 4. Should any person who may procure a license as herein provided fully allow his or her dog to go upon any street in the city without having upon the neck the tag as herein provided, shall forfeit thereby his license, and the Marshall shall take up such dog as hereinafter provided for in cases where a dog or slut may be upon any street of said city without a license. Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Marshall to take up all dogs or sluts which may be upon any street or public place in said city, which have not been licensed as in the ordinance provided and safely keep such dog or slut for the period of ten days and at the time of taking up of such dog or slut the Marshall shall post notices in three public places in said city, carefully describing said dog or slut, and that the same has been taken up by the Marshall of said city and require the owner of such dog or slut to come forward and pay charges and redeem said dog or slut, and when the charges, as hereinafter provided, are paid the Marshall shall release the said dog or slut to the owner thereof. Provided, that the said owner of such dog or slut shall not come forward within the said period of ten days the Marshall shall proceed to kill said dog or slut. Sec. 6. The Marshall receives for his services in taking up such dog or slut as may be upon any street or public place in said city, which have not been licensed as hereinbefore provided for, for each dog or slut taken up, \$1.00 and his necessary expenses for keeping the same and for killing each dog or slut \$1.00. Providing in all cases such dog is killed or disposed of, the city shall pay such expenses and in case the dog or slut is redeemed the cost and expenses shall be paid by the owner of such dog or slut, or the person redeeming such dog or slut. Sec. 7. The Recorder shall receive for his services for issuing the license as hereinbefore provided, the sum of seventy-five cents out of the license so paid and shall make a report to the treasurer and pay the remainder into the general fund of the city. Sec. 8. Provided that nothing in this ordinance shall apply to dogs owned outside of the city limits that accompany their masters while in the city. ORDINANCE NO. 5. AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR PROTECTION FROM FIRE BY STOVE PIPES. The people of Tillamook City do ordain: Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, or persons, company or corporation to build own or maintain, within the corporate limits of the City of Tillamook, a house or building of any kind in which fire is used, with a stovepipe extending through the roof, or outside walls. Provided that any dwelling that is 100 feet or more from any other building may not come within the provisions of this ordinance. Sec. 2. That where a stove-pipe passes through a ceiling, floor or partition it shall be secured in its passage by a double tin or sheet-iron safe with perforated cast ends. Sec. 3. Any body violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00 and cost, for each offense, provided that sixty days shall expire after the publication of this act, before it takes effect. ORDINANCE NO. 6. AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF STOCK. The people of Tillamook City do ordain: Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any horses, mules, swine or cattle of any kind other than milk cows, kept for milk, to run at large within the corporate limits of the City of Tillamook.

above, found in violation of sec. 1 and 2 of this act shall be put in the pound by the City Marshall, who shall upon the payment to him by the owner of the same, the sum of \$1.00, within 24 hours release the same, but if not released within 24 hours the Marshall shall give immediate notice of the taking up of such animal, with a description thereof, posting the same in three conspicuous places in the city. Sec. 4. If any animal so taken up at the expiration of five days from the date of such notice in the case of horses, mules or cattle, or of twenty-four hours in the case of any other animals, the Marshall shall sell such animal at public auction after due notice, to consist of at least one insertion in the official city paper in the case of horses, mules, or cattle, and twenty-four hours notice duly posted as above provided, and after deducting his legal fees and all costs; expense of taking up, keeping and selling, shall pay the remainder of the proceeds of such sale into the city treasury. Sec. 5. If at any time before such sale, the owner of any animal so taken up shall claim the same, he or she shall be entitled to the possession thereof upon the payment of all legal charges and expenses incidental to such taking up and keeping. Sec. 6. The Marshall, besides the cost of keeping any animal taken up and impounded, shall be entitled to receive as his legal fees \$1.00 per head for cattle, horses or mules and 50 cts. per head for sheep, goats or swine, and 10 cts. per head of the proceeds of any sale when the amount does not exceed \$25.00, and 5 per cent. an any amount exceeding such sum. Sec. 7. If the owner or owners of any property sold under these provisions shall at any time within one year from the date of such sale, make satisfactory proof of the ownership, he or they shall be entitled to receive the net proceeds of such sale on deposit in the city treasury. Approved April 20 1891. ORDINANCE NO. 7. AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLICATION OF ORDINANCES. The people of Tillamook City do ordain: Sec. 1. That all ordinances now passed and those which shall be passed hereafter, be published in full one time in a weekly newspaper published in the said Tillamook City. Sec. 2. That all ordinances shall be in effect and full force from and after the date of their publication as aforesaid unless otherwise provided. Approved April 20, 1891. John Barker, A. P.
