CITY ORDINANCES.

ORDINANCE NO. 18.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF

LEVYING A TAX TO IMPROVE THE STREETS.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain:

SEC. 1 That an assessment shall be

levied for the purpose of graveling and

improving the streets as follows: on

Lots 1, 5, 6, 7 and 8 of block 1; lots 4, 5, 7

and 8, of block 2; lots 1, 5, 6, 7 and 8, of

block 3; lots 5, 6, 7 and 8, of block 4;

lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, of block 7; lots 1, 2, 3,

and 4, of block 8; lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, of

block 6; lots 1, 2, 3, 4 and 8, of block 10;

of the old survey of Tillamook City:

The north half of block 1 and lot 2, of

Thayer's addition to Tillamook: The

land abutting 2nd Ave., on east side from

91 ft. south of N.E. corner of the E. Thomas

D. L. C., south to First St. The land ly-

ing north of First St. from east side of

2nd Ave. E. to the east side of 3rd Ave.

E., of 50 cts per front foot: And on lots

1 and 8 of block 8, fronting Stillwell

Ave., lots 4 and 5 of block 9 on Stillwell

Ave.: All land fronting Stillwell Ave.

from Second St. to the north side of

Fourth St. also all the land abutting 2nd

Ave. E. from Second St. on the west side

to the north side of Fifth St. lots 1 and 2

of block 1, lots 1 and 6 of block 3; lots

1 and 6 of block 5, lots 1 and 6 of block

7, of Thayer's addition, 25 cts per front

foot.

SEC. 2 Said improvements shall be

made by those who have bid to do their

own work on or before Oct. 1st 1891:

All the balance to be proceeded with by

the contractors, Wheeler & Elliott, assess-  
ments payable as soon as work is finished  
and the Recorder is hereby directed to  
place all of the above listed property on  
the Lien Book and if the assessment is  
not paid at the time provided for in this  
ordinance, he shall proceed to sell the  
same, or as much thereof as shall be  
necessary to pay such assessment and  
cost as provided for in the City charter.

ORDINANCE NO. 19.

AN ORDINANCE TO DEFINE THE MANNER OF

IMPROVING STREETS:

The people of Tillamook City do ordain:

That all streets that have been or may

hereafter be ordered improved, shall be

improved as follows:

The surface dirt shall be excavated to

one foot below the established grade, and

then fill in Sixches deep in the center and

rounded to 6 inches deep at sides with

coarse gravel and covered with river

gravel 4 inches deep in center rounded to

2 inches deep at sides; all to be made

smooth and even and solidly tamped.

All side walks shall be built on a line

with the established grade at the out

side raising 1/2 inch to the foot, to the

building line which shall be 4 inches

above the street grade line except where

a separate grade is established for side

walks and streets. Any failure to com-  
ply with the provisions of this ordinance  
when ordered so to do by the street com-  
missioner shall be deemed a misdemeanor  
and on conviction before the Recorder  
shall be punishable by a fine of not less  
than \$25.00 nor more than \$50.00 and  
cost.
