Yes, paddle, grub and dig, and so it is  
with the young men and old men of Til-  
lamook, Oregon.

From the cannery, Oretown, Upton-  
ville, or Barnhart's Point to Woods on  
the Big Nestuck, is but a few miles; but  
a mile of tide, mixed with deep channels  
of ebb and flow and slippery boat land-  
ing, counts just double, hence in making  
Woods from Oretown, is like going from  
Bay City to Tillamook by way of Port-  
land and Hobsonville. But you do get  
there all the same, either by boat, ocean  
beach, Haystack rock and cattle trails, if  
you are lucky enough to make the har-  
bor without anchoring on a sand hill.

Having lived alone for some time in  
"old woods," the sight of new Woods was  
a revelation. A year makes a change in  
these boom days. Young Woods is grow-  
ing. True, he is not as big as "old  
mountain woods," yet the youngster is  
putting on airs, dresses in store clothes  
and will soon take his "Kansas nipe" in  
a veritable drug store. Nor, is that all;  
the saw-mill is slashing out lumber,  
teams are busy delivering and two big  
contractors, Plank & Steele, (don't think  
they steal plank), are building up houses  
as fast as Bob Hays of Tillamook is rais-  
ing hen coops. Bob's hens are of the  
Plymouth Rock stock, and so are some  
of the Woodsites—glorious old go-ahead  
crows—they have always cut a swath,  
mowing and grubbing their way from the  
Atlantic to the Pacific. But there at  
Woods they can go no further, must  
anchor and build a town, cant help it, no  
chance to go back, must go ahead.

Not finding the newspaper started, or  
the preacher at home, or other affini-  
ties, the road up the Big Nestuck became our  
best friend.

But a little way around the nooks, the  
lawns and grades—one, two, three, four  
wagons, women, children, men, dogs,  
guns, tents, poles and fish-poles.

Along their way from the Willamette valley,  
With Johnny and Jimmy and Kitty and Sally,  
Old Ocean's doctor and his believers,  
Is lightning on health but death to their fevers.

And that, with the fish they catch, is  
what they come for.

The next man we met was a small boy  
with his big father, both engaged in  
building a compound pig-pen, composed  
of split rails, peeled poles, saw logs and  
last year's bee-hives. The pigs num-  
bered seven and belonged to a stately and  
stalwart mother. The pen and the pigs  
—well why not compare them to a prize  
ring? The Oregonian and other moral  
papers devote columns to the Sullivan  
breed of hogs. Suppose that in their  
agricultural columns they would give a  
receipt how to make bacon from such  
hogs. But we live in a moral and im-  
proving age, call it progressive civiliza-  
tion and bless the Lord we live in the  
Nineteenth Century.
