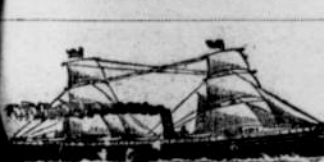

TILLAMOOK HORSES SUCCESSFUL.
A large attendance at the Fair Ground and good receipts at the gate.—Everything passes off pleasantly.

The weather was fine and the track was in good condition. The attendance on Friday was large, but still larger on Saturday. The grand stand was crowded both days.

The following is an account of Friday's sport on the Fair Ground race track:

1. Running; Pony Race; best two in three; 400 yards. Purse \$15.00. Entrance fee \$2.50.
Entries:—Juanita, Bay Mare.
Dandy, Sorrel Gelding.
Maud B., Buckskin Mare.
Juanita took first money; time, 25.
Dandy, second money.
Maud B. won the first heat in 24, but fell behind in the second and could not be induced to come to the score in the third, flying the track at the start.

Betting was three to one on Juanita from the start.

2. Running; Race, best two in three; 400 yards Purse \$20.00. Entrance fee \$5.00.
Entries:—Snowflake, White Mare.
Roan Gelding.
Snowflake, known as "White Ally," won the race; time, 24½ and 27.
The Roan won the first heat in 24, but showed lameness very bad and in the last heat was "not in it" at all.

Before the second heat, pools sold two to one in favor of the Roan, after which Snowflake flopped and was favorite, four to one.

3. Running; Race, free for all horses; best two in three; one-half mile. Purse \$50.00. Entrance fee \$10.00.
Entries:—Frank, Sorrel Gelding.
Jack, Brown "
Frank won; time, 58.
Frank was favorite in the pool box three to one, and came home in a canter on the last heat.

Frank won easily, distancing Snowflake in the first heat. Juanita was no match for Frank and flew the track in the second heat, giving Frank first and second money. Snowflake is conceded to be faster than Juanita, but it is generally believed she was held by her rider to save her for the second and third heats but if such was the case, he held her a little too long, causing her to be shut out.

5. Running Race; single dash; one mile Purse \$50.00. Entrance fee \$10.00.

Long Creek Bill, bay, by Newt Leslie.
Won easily by Frank.

6. Trotting Race; Tillamook buggy horses; best two in three; one-half mile. Purse \$25.00. Entrance fee \$2.50.

Minnie B., gray, Dr. Patchen.
Nig, black, by A. Janney.
First heat won by Nig; time, 2:26.
Second and third heat won by Dandy; time, 2:12. Minnie B. was shut out in the second heat. Pool selling was spirited in this race, and it was the cause of a great deal of fun.

Immediately after noon there was a match race, \$60 a side, by Long Creek Bill and Gid Davidson's horse, won by the latter.

THE FOURTH AT NEHALEM.
