OREGON'S CAVE.

The following is from the last Sunday's New York Herald: "The state of Kentucky has heretofore maintained a monopoly of the Mammoth Cave business. The big hole in the ground which is her pride and boast has acted as a bluff to insolent competition in that industry. A few upstart and insignificant cavities in other parts of the country have put on airs and largely advertised their pretensions, but when compared with the Kentucky hole they proved to be no more than woodchuck burrows and have slunk away like a sneak thief to hide their littleness in obscurity. But when the great and flourishing state of Oregon comes to the front and tells us that she has a cave which will startle the imagination of science and force Kentucky to pale her ineffectual fires we have a premonition that the Mammoth must at last surrender its glories. The Pacific coast deals only in the biggest things in creation. It has trees so

as pinnacles, its grapes are as precious that you wish your throat were half a mile long, and everything it produces is the best on the planet. The new cave which has just been discovered fairly thrills the soul with wonder. You enter it through a narrow fissure in a limestone rock. After wandering several miles you are ushered into a series of chambers, the dazzling beauty of whose stalactites make you think of the wonders of fairy land. There are also giant pillars, milk white, which uphold the roof, and streams of crystal water to make rippling music for the bewildered traveler. The gentlemen who spent a week in exploring it found in one place a small lake and in another a waterfall thirty feet high. We are sorry for the Mammoth Cave, but it will have to lower its flag to its Pacific rival. It has enjoyed a proud distinction of many years, but the awe-inspiring discovery in Josephine county, Oregon, shows that westward the march of empire and other huge things takes its way, and while we offer our condolence to the Blue Grass state we extend our hearty congratulations to Oregon."

Of the 332 members of the next house, 237 are Democrats, 87 Republicans and 8 Alliance men. Of the states, 16 have solid Democratic delegations and 13 others have a Democratic majority. The Alliance have a majority in two states. Ten states have a solid Republican delegation, and in two others that party has a majority. The Democrats have a majority in all the large states except Pennsylvania. The Illinois delegation stands 14 to 6, Indiana, 11 to 3, Michigan, 8 to 3, New York, 23 to 11, Ohio, 14 to 7. Alliance men have 5 in Kansas to 2 Republicans, and in Nebraska 2 Alliance men to 1 Democrat. Minnesota has 3 Democrats, 1 Alliance and 1 Republican. If the presidential election is thrown into the house, the Democratic candidate would have 39 votes, the Republicans 12, the Alliance 2.

Mrs. Lucy Pratt, a young widow, of San Francisco, sold 45 square inches of her skin for \$1000. A strip of skin 9x5 inches was cut from her body by surgeons and grafted into the leg of William A. Daggett, a railway clerk, who was frightfully injured in a railroad accident at Port Costa. His right leg was terribly burned and the wound would not heal, and as a last resort skin grafting was resorted to. W. G. McGregory, a fellow clerk of the sufferer, volunteered to make the sacrifice, but when he learned how much skin was needed, backed out. Mrs. Pratt is one of the trained nurses at the hospital for children and training school for nurses. She has three children and needs money, so she offered to furnish the necessary amount of skin. She submitted bravely to the operation, which was successfully performed.

The Butte city postmaster lately received a postal card addressed: "J. Christ, care of the Father, Highest Heaven Amen." The other side of the card read: "O Father in heaven, come down from above, and pity thy wandering child. O Precious Redeemer, how long must I rove and tramp o'er this country wild? ORDINANCE NO. 23.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE. The people of Tillamook City do ordain: That Sec. 2 of Ordinance No. 18, be amended to read as follows after the words "assessments payable;" "As soon as work is commenced by the contractors doing the work," and that portion of said Section in conflict with the foregoing is hereby repealed.

NOTICE OF ASSESSMENTS DUE.

Notice is hereby given to the owners of land upon First St. from 3rd Ave. E. to 2nd Ave. W., Stillwell Ave. from Front St. to Fourth St., and 2nd Ave. E. from bridge to Fifth St., that the assessment levied upon said land according to Ordinance No. 18, of Tillamook City, for the improvement of streets, is now due, and must be paid to the City Treasurer within ten days from date hereof. The Street Commissioner will inform the land owners of the amount of assessment upon application.

Unless the amount of the assessment on such work that is already done be paid before the expiration of fifteen days from date, the property will be levied upon, and enough of it will be sold to satisfy such assessment and costs.
