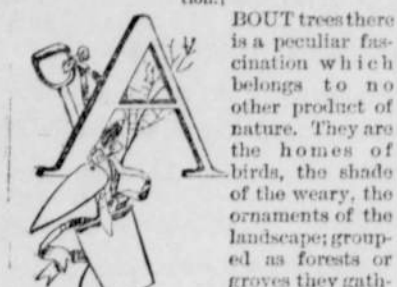

NOW FLOURISHING BECAUSE OF THE INSTITUTION OF ARBOR DAY.

ABOUT trees there is a peculiar fascination which belongs to no other product of nature. They are the homes of birds, the shade of the weary, the ornaments of the landscape, the companions of the lonely, the symbols of life and growth. They are the great benefactors of the human race, and it is in recognition of this principle and as a matter of self preservation that the people of thirty-seven states of the Union have established a spring observance known as Arbor Day. The first commonwealth to take action in this regard was Nebraska, which in 1872 set apart a certain day for tree planting. The custom did not long remain singular to that state, but was adopted within a few years by nearly all the others with the most happy results. Schools particularly became interested in the affair, and as a consequence there have been planted and are now flourishing in the American republic over one billion trees that never would have had existence but for the institution of Arbor Day.

This spring brings a renewal of the ceremonies connected with the beautiful and wholesome celebration, and for the next two months all over the land children will plant and care for tender saplings that in later years shall grow to giant monarchs redolent with nature's perfume and abounding with grateful shade. No form of tree thus selected for perpetuation is without a world-old history, always interesting and often romantic.

Arbor Day has been now so long observed that the details of its celebration in the way of public exercises are quite well established, and no suggestions therefore need be given herewith. But the following extract from a circular of the Illinois State Horticultural society may prove an aid to those who are yet undecided as to what trees to plant:

For Parks—Maple, elm, sycamore, birch, black walnut, catalpa, magnolia, Norway maple, hackberry, linden, ash, mulberry, tulip tree, box elder, Norway spruce, white pine, Scotch pine, chestnut.

For Streets—Elm, hackberry, sugar maple, ash, linden, tulip tree, sycamore, catalpa, Norway maple, black walnut, linden, hackberry.

For Country Roads—Elm, sugar maple, catalpa, Norway maple, black walnut, linden, hackberry.

For School Grounds—Elm, sugar maple, tulip tree, catalpa, Norway maple, linden, ash, Norway spruce, Scotch pine.

For Cemeteries—Elm, sugar maple, tulip tree, catalpa, Norway maple, linden, ash, Norway spruce, Scotch pine.

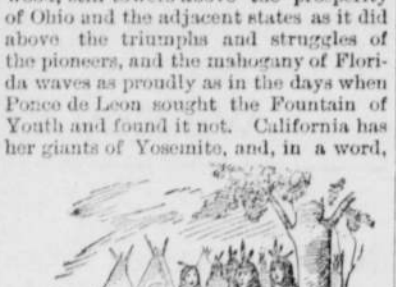

INFORMATION OF A NATURE SURE TO INTEREST RURALISTS.

A Simple Three Horse Arrangement That Precludes All Chance for Either Animal to Get Any Advantage Described with the Aid of Illustrations.

The three horse eveners here illustrated was contrived and has been used for two seasons by a Connecticut farmer, who writes about it as follows in The Rural New Yorker:

For the neck yoke take a single piece of tough timber of the desired size and length and cut it into three pieces, making a joint six inches on each side of the

middle by bolting on two strips of iron, as shown in cut (Fig. 1). The pole chain rings A are the same distance from the center ring B. The pole rings C are one-third of the distance from A to B.

Equalize the draught by a bar of iron 1 by 2 inches, containing three holes. The end holes are 7 inches apart and the middle hole is 24 inches from one end (see Fig. 4). The bar stands vertically, with the edge to the front, in the center of the piece which fills the place of the pole and back of the cross bar to the shafts, or poles, and is held by a bolt through the middle hole. A long eveners attached to the top or short end of the bar takes the draught of the outside horses, while a whiffletree at the lower end, under the cross bar, takes that of the middle horse. There is no possible chance for either horse to get any advantage. The whole thing is shown in the cut. It is simple, light and brings the team near the load.

A Woman's Views on Poultry.

An Ohio woman writing in the New York World on poultry expressed the following views:

Where one is keeping poultry with an eye singly to profit, I consider that it is imperative that only year old hens and pullets be kept, the other hens are for no means worthless, either for culinary purposes at home or to market. Henskeepers are glad to get them for boiling, for fricassee and for soups.

Where eggs only are required, the very best plan, in my experience, has been to keep pullets only, but when eggs and chickens are both required my plan is to keep half and half of year old hens and pullets of various ages from February to May. It occasionally happens that it pays to keep a really good hen for as many as three seasons, as she will lay the eggs to supply you with thriving young ones as well as fresh eggs for the table during the late spring and summer.

There appears no reason why, if women lead their time to the care of poultry at all, they should not keep that which is pure bred. I have found many advantages and no disadvantages in keeping pure birds. I like to see shapely and beautiful planned birds on my grounds, to begin with. Then, instead of having on hand a lot of cockerels to kill off for home consumption, I can sell them at a fair price to those who desire to infuse into their flocks new blood. The surplus hens and pullets are always in demand at good prices. If you are anxious to advertise your flocks the pure bred birds make a fine show at the state and county fairs. In regard to cross breeds I will say here that first-class birds are often very valuable egg producers, but further breeding from the crossed birds has not been with me successful, as the best qualities of the two breeds originally crossed deteriorate and in time disappear. There are, however, exceptions to this, as to most other rules.

Fattening Calves.

In raising calves for veal the sooner the young animals are fattened and sufficiently matured for the purpose the more profit there will be in it. This will be accomplished by the natural process of drawing the milk from the mother sooner than by artificial feeding, and calves that are allowed to suck their dams will be preferred by the butcher. As a matter of profit to dairymen the milk will be of more value than the calf, but to a farmer who has plenty of milk and a poor market for it it may be quite different. In this case it is simply a question of the best way to fatten the calf. It is clearly all the milk of the cow is required, then remove the calf as soon as he has enough and strip the cow clean at once. Where half of the milk will be sufficient the first half will be the best fattening, and it will be a question for the owner to decide whether the calf shall have the first or the last. It should, however, be remembered that there is nothing to be gained by limiting the milk ration of a calf that is being fattened for veal or in attempting to fatten him on skim milk.

Do Not.

An absconding swain, as the name suggests, is one that has separated from the cluster and is going to his new home before the beekeeper has had an opportunity of hiving it. To capture an absconding swain beekeepers practice throwing water among them in a fine spray by means of a hand pump.
