The tragical incidence of Wednesday
morning has assumed another phase.
Mrs. Palmer, failing to carve Mr. Still-
well's anatomy, swore out a warrant
against him before Justice Thompson,
alleging that he had attempted rape on
her little daughter.
Mr. Stillwell was arrested and taken
before the Justice for examination. De-
puty District Attorney A. W. Severance
appeared for the state and James McCain
for the defense. The defendant waived
examination and was bound over in the
sum of \$500 to appear before the grand
jury which convenes shortly.
This whole affair is very unfortunate
and embarrassing to Mr. Stillwell and
his friends, and it is generally believed
that he is entirely innocent of the charges,
being the victim of unjust persecution.
If the widow lady, Mrs. Palmer, had
good reason to believe Mr. Stillwell
guilty, however, she is not to be con-
demned for her course, and if he is
guilty he should suffer the consequences,
but it looks very much as if the lady
made a serious mistake, and through
some misapprehension has prosecuted
an innocent man, and brought on her
self an undesirable notoriety. The mere
charge of such a crime against a man is
also a horrible stigma to rest under, but
Mr. Stillwell is of respectable family and
has always borne a good reputation. He
is a young man, about 23 years of age,
has been successful in his business, is
sober, industrious and intelligent. His
father, Hon. Wm. D. Stillwell, is Joint
Representative for Tillamook. Several
witnesses were present when the alleged
offense occurred, and say there is nothing
whatever in the charge.
On the other hand the complaining
witness is a widow, with no particular
friends to look after her interests, and
this alone creates sympathy, and some-
even go so far as to believe a crime was
committed. If Mrs. Palmer had been
more deliberate and had consulted Mr.
Stillwell and the bystanders regarding
the affair, it is probable that this very
unfortunate affair would have been drop-
ped at the time.

Extensive Preparations are being made
by the Tillamook Fair Association
and a Grand Time is
Expected.
To THE PEOPLE OF TILLAMOOK:—The
Directors of the Tillamook Fair Association
in presenting this catalogue of their
projected Annual Fair, deplore the fact
that the premiums offered and purses
are not as numerous or as large as might
be desired. The Association has come
to stay, however, and does not propose
to bite off more than it can chew. It ex-
pects to expend in premiums and inci-
dental expenses as much, if not more,
than it will receive.
The Association was not organized to
make money for any man or any of the
stock-holders, but to afford a place where
our little county fair can be held annu-
ally; where all of our people can come
for a few days camping-out and social
recreation, and where the products and
stock of our country can be brought
together for examination and comparison.
In case the people are liberal and gen-
erous in their support, we shall do better
in the future.
Where no money premiums are offered,
blue and red ribbons will be awarded for
first and second premiums.
The catalogue of the Tillamook Fair
Association for the First Annual Fair, to
be held at Tillamook City, Tillamook
County, Oregon, commencing on the
1st day of September, 1891, to continue
three days is as follows:
PROGRAMME OF RACES.
1ST DAY.
Tuesday September 1st.
1. Running race, free for all, 600
yards and repeat; purse \$50; entrance
\$20, added.
2. Trotting race for 2-year-olds; 1/2
mile and repeat; purse \$25; entrance \$15,
added.
3. Trotting race, gentlemen's buggy
horses, 1/2 mile; entrance \$5 to make
purse. Association will add buggy robe
for first horse, and whip for last horse.
Horses to have been owned three months
in Tillamook county, and to be driven
by owners.
2ND DAY.
Wednesday Sept. 2nd.
4. Pony race, 14 hands or under;
440 yards and repeat; purse \$20; entrance
\$5, added.
5. Running race, for two-year-old
Tillamook bred horses; 1/2 mile single
dash; purse \$25; entrance \$10 added.
6. Running race, free for all; 1/2 mile
and repeat; purse \$50; entrance \$20,
added.
7. Best display of lady equestrianism,
\$5; second best \$2.50.
3RD DAY.
Thursday Sept. 3rd.
8. Trotting race, free for all; one
mile; purse \$25; entrance \$15, added.
9. Running race, free for all; one
mile, single dash; purse \$50; entrance
\$20, added.
10. Consolation purse, \$15; best two
in three, 440 yards. For horses that
have taken no part of purses.
RULES.
In all races three to enter and two to
start are required.
No money given for a walk-over.
Running races will be conducted ac-
cording to the rules of the Pacific Blood
Horse association; trotting races, accord-
ing to the rules of the National Trotting
Association.
In races for less than 1/2 mile the dis-
tance flag shall be ninety feet.
All purses shall be divided, two-thirds
to winner, and one-third to second.
In the one mile trotting race, if the
race does not fill, any horse entering and
trotting in 2:40, or better, shall be en-
titled to the purse.
