In Darkest Tillamook.
B. C. Lamb and the writer explored the interior of the peninsula between Tillamook bay and the Pacific ocean last Saturday.
After getting lost several times and following blind bear trails for several hours through the dark and gloomy hemlock forests, we undertook to emerge into sunlight again. We started down a canyon towards the beach, but the underbrush grew thicker and thicker. We tried backing out until all the clothing on our posterior was in shreds; we couldn't climb out, so we got down on our marrow bones and slowly but painfully crawled down the bed of a rocky-

Spokane bridge and across through walls of salmon brush that would discourage a rhinoceros. Whenever we came to a log, we sat down and cried bitterly, regretting the day when we left good comfortable homes in civilized lands. Vividly could we see our mistakes of the past, and we inwardly promised to do better if we ever got safely out. Finally the roar of the billows became more distinct and all at once the terra infirma gave way beneath us, and with a lot of sticks and rubbish, we rolled down into an undignified heap on the long-sought-for trail, twenty feet below. After pulling ourselves together, and taking some snake medicine, which we had desperately clung to, we slowly but sadly followed the trail to a habitation, where kind and loving hands dressed our wounds, renewed our raiment and tenderly laid us to bed.

A man who is not accustomed to traveling in an Oregon forest should take a guide, or keep on the high ridges. The deep canyons are not imperial highways by any means.

At Netarts.

Henry Roberts.
This community mourns the loss of another one of its respected citizens. Henry Roberts died Monday evening, August 24, 1891. He was born at Canton, Bradford Co., Pa., Dec. 5, 1836, went to Iowa in 1858; was married there in 1859, and came to the Pacific Coast in 1880, living in Tillamook for the past six years.
He served four years in the Union Army during the late war, enlisting in Co. E 6th Iowa, Vol. Inf., and fought with Grant from the battle of Belmont to Missionary Ridge, and with Sherman on his Atlanta campaign. He received five wounds while on duty. Mustered in the G. A. R. in 1886 as a member of Corinth post, and has held the position of Adjutant ever since with the exception of one year.
Henry Roberts was a true comrade, a good citizen and a kind father and husband.
The funeral occurred to day at I. O. O. F. Cemetery.

Another Pioneer Gone.
J. C. Champion died Sunday at the residence of W. S. Kimball.
He was a native of England and was born in 1823, coming to America while yet a young man. He landed in Boston where he remained awhile, and afterward made trips back to England and around the world as a sailor. He lived for a time in San Francisco and at one time in Philadelphia where several of his relatives reside at the present time. But most of his days were spent on the Pacific coast.
In 1851 he left Astoria in a small boat with two men, Sam Howard and W. Taylor, for Tillamook, a country which he had heard spoken of by Indian trappers. They found considerable difficulty in making an entrance into Tillamook Bay, not being acquainted with the bar, but after lying outside over night entered safely with their small craft. They made a landing near Kilbuck point, and were hospitably received by the Indians, but Taylor and Howard became discouraged and returned to Astoria immediately leaving "Joe," as he was commonly known, with the Indians.
He lived in various places in the neighborhood, and at one time resided in a hollow tree.
He left in a few months however, but returned later, and though absent at one time for a short period after this, is entitled to the distinction of being the first white settler in Tillamook. It is claimed that another man was here prior to his coming, but there is no authentic record of it. Other settlers came, and Joe was a great favorite among them, being acquainted with the Indians and able to secure many favors from them.
He was a highly educated man and held the office of County Clerk at one time. Of later years he has been prostrate with disease, and has been a county charge, but he always bore his sufferings with fortitude.
The funeral occurred on Monday, T. B. Handley making an appropriate oration at the grave.

That Road Case.
The Circuit Court has decided that the County Court was in error when it vacated the proposed road on the northeast side of Wilson river between here and Bay City, and now the whole question will be fought over again. It is claimed that Mr. Freeman will make another attempt to have it vacated, but J. W. Lattimer and others interested with the other side claim that public sentiment has so charged that the proposed road will be built. It is to be hoped that this annoying controversy can be settled by some compromise so that all the neighborhood interested will be satisfied.

LATER.—It is understood that this matter will be taken to the Supreme Court for a decision as to the legality of posting the notices.

On further investigation it was discovered that a small box, about 6 x 10 x 20 inches, had been recently removed. The impression of the box in the dirt was plain to be seen. Who took it, and what they intend to do with it, is a mystery, but it was undoubtedly the counterfeiting outfit.

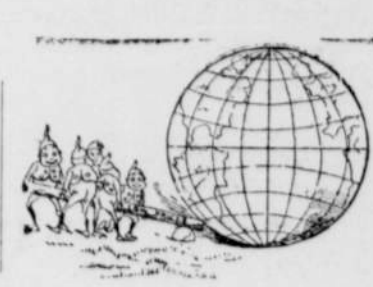
A Vicious Pronunciation.

This tendency has become so marked that the "pipers" themselves have begun, at least in a whimsical way, to print words which have a long a with a y instead. The Pall Mall Gazette in an article on "Primrose Day," devoted to the memory of Lord Beaconsfield, fancies Englishmen singing:
But who will syve old England from the shyme,
And her sons and her daughters who will syve
For in vyne, alas in vyne we deplore the hon-
ored nyme
Of Lord Beckingsfield, now lying in his cryve.

This vicious pronunciation has begun to creep into a limited circle in America, whose members affect English ways. It should be rejected and resolutely discouraged by every one who wishes to speak good English.—Youth's Companion.

Where Do You Part Your Hair?
I have seen hundreds of barbers' trade secrets exposed, but I have never seen a reason given in print for men parting their hair on the left side in more than nine cases out of ten. I talked the matter over with a physician once, and he said it might be only a coincidence, but that at least nine men out of ten sleep on their right side, because by so doing digestion is aided and the action of the heart is left undisturbed.
That, I think, accounts for the hair parting, because the warmth of the side of the head pressed into the pillow greatly aids the growth of the hair, and a man naturally parts his hair so as to brush it in the direction of the greatest growth. This also accounts for what almost every one who has tried to keep his mustache and beard evenly trimmed must have noticed—that he has to trim the right side more frequently than the left. Warmth is the best hair tonic and invigorator discovered, especially a moist heat, such as is produced by confined perspiration.—Interview in St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

How Some Deafies Have Been Produced.
The immediate factor in the stoppage of growth seems to be the hardening of the bones, particularly the long bones, through the secretion of lime. But this is probably a mere incident resulting from the influence of food, excessive physical exercise, cold, or some other force affecting the general system.
Among the recipes given for checking the growth of children is that of anointing the backbone with fat of bats and moles.
