CITY ORDINANCE.

ORDINANCE NO. 28.

An Ordinance to provide for holding elections.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain:

SEC. 1. There shall be a General Election in the town of Tillamook on the first Monday in December in each year, at which all officers required to be elected by the qualified voters of the town shall be elected.
SEC. 2. The Council shall designate the place for holding the election and shall appoint three Judges and two Clerks of Election.
SEC. 3. The Recorder, under the direction of the Council, shall give ten days notice, published in some paper in the town of Tillamook, of each general or special election, the officers to be elected, the place designated for the holding of the election and the names of the Judges and Clerks appointed to conduct the same.
SEC. 4. All elections shall be held from 9 A. M. until 12 M., and from 1 P. M. to 4 o'clock P. M. And, when not otherwise provided for in this ordinance, all general and special elections shall be held under the provisions of an act passed by the Legislature at their sixteenth regular session in 1891, to regulate general elections, known as the Australian ballot system, page 8, Session Laws, 1891.
SEC. 5. If any of the Judges of Election fail to attend at the proper time, the voters present may elect another in his place, and if any Clerk fails to attend, the Judges of Election may appoint another in his place.
SEC. 6. Judges and Clerks of Election must possess the qualifications of an elector, but a mistake or a error in this respect or a failure to give the notice heretofore provided for, shall not invalidate any election otherwise legal.
SEC. 7. On or before the second day after election, the returns thereof shall be filed with the Recorder, and on the fourth day after the election, or sooner if the returns are in, the Recorder shall call to his assistance a Notary Public and a Justice of the Peace residing in the town of Tillamook, and the three shall then canvass the returns of the election.
SEC. 8. A written statement of the canvass shall be made and signed by the Canvassers, or a majority of them, and filed with the Recorder within the time to complete the canvass. Such written statement must contain the whole number of votes cast at such election, the number given for any person for any office, and the names of the persons elected and to what office.
SEC. 9. Immediately after the completion of the canvass, the Recorder must make and sign a certificate of election for each person declared elected, and deliver the same to him on demand. And in case of a tie for any office the tying candidates shall decide the same by casting lots, which shall be done in presence of the City Council which is the final judge of the qualifications and election of its own members.
SEC. 10. Judges and Clerks of Election shall receive two dollars each for their services for each election.
SEC. 11. Provided that the Recorder shall have the tickets printed and ready for distribution not less than twenty four hours before the opening of the polls.
SEC. 12. When mention is made of County Clerk in the aforementioned election law, the same shall refer to City Recorder, so far as applicable to the city municipal elections for Tillamook city.
