STREET FIGHT!

A HORRIBLE AND LONG DRAWN COMBAT.

Several Parties Took a Hand but no One Seriously Hurt.

Last Monday evening Mike Cavanaugh and Dave Howard had a rough and tumble fight on the street. The fight first started in Hadley's saloon over some trivial matter, as both contestants were drunk, and it seems that Howard struck Cavanaugh on the head with a bottle. As soon as the fight began, Mr. Hadley, the proprietor put the belligerents out, and a few moments later the fight was renewed on the street witnessed by a great many excited people. Both of the contestants are powerful and rugged men and the affair was most horrible and brutal to be witnessed. They seemed to have too much liquor to strike accurately with their fists and tried kicking, and the blows dealt by their feet were like the kicks of an ox. Pretty soon there was a lull, and Howard begged off saying that he was too drunk to fight, but all at once it started again. The men yet seemed about equal, but Clark Hadley rushed up and struck Howard. At this juncture James Squires and some others took a hand, and the crowd was so mixed up that it was hard telling who were friends or foes. Dave Hadley knocked Howard down in order to make him drop a stone which he was going to use. James Squires had a rock, but one of the crowd held a revolver on him, and the stone was suddenly let go. C. B. Hadley came up and tried to quiet the crowd, and was pulling men out of the melee and separating them, apparently with the ease of a giant, until he got things quiet again.

The two principals were not satisfied, however, and came together again. They fought up the street and back again; then into the Occidental hotel office. Ye scribe was in the hotel office when they came in fighting, but he crawled out through a crack in the wall without saying good-evening, and was satisfied with what he could see through the key-hole. "They rolled and they tumbled, And fought on the floor."

Both were badly scratched, bruised and bitten, and half exhausted, and hopelessly entangled they rolled down in a corner, both crying enough. They were washed and taken to bed, but soon came together again in one of the rooms up stairs, and fought savagely again. The earthenware in the room was smashed to smithereens on the devoted pate of one of them, and it was difficult and dangerous work to get them separated. This was the last engagement of the last campaign. All was quiet until Tuesday morning, when the combatants arose as fresh as ever, except a few ugly bruises on Howard's face, and a bitten thumb belonging to Cavanaugh. Clark Hadley and Dave Hadley pleaded guilty to fighting and were fined each \$5 and costs. Cavanaugh pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs. Squires has not yet been arrested. Howard stood trial before Recorder Nolan and a jury and was acquitted on the technical grounds that he did not push the fight in the street.

The offense was a grave one. The punishments were very light. If the prosecutions had been made for riot, and the matter carried to the Circuit Court, it might have gone hard with all implicated. It will be well for those interested to take warning. This was an aggravated and obnoxious performance, and the matter cannot be passed over lightly by the city authorities. Such riotous demonstrations must be dealt with severely.

The combatants are good natured and well behaved men when sober, and had been good friends until this occurrence, which was caused by excessive drinking. Cavanaugh, known here as Mike, has a claim on Wilson river, and has had charge of the boarding camp for the force which worked on the Runyon road. He is a generous hearted man, always ready to care for the sick, and is seldom in trouble, and not boisterous unless intoxicated. Howard has been working in the logging camps, and has had no trouble heretofore in this place, excepting that he kicked Jim Wilson out in the first round, in a ring fight some time ago.

by the Jury. The trial was held before City Recorder G. O. Nolan, Deputy A. W. Severance and E. E. Selph appearing for the prosecution and T. B. Handley for the defense. Jones claims it was all spite work, on account of a dispute as to the charges made for caring for the dying man.

A Story of Adventure.

The steam schooner Wm. H. Harrison arrived from Nestucca Friday A. M. with Wm. McDonald and John Kursh from the sealing schooner Oscar and Hattie of Victoria. They are two of the three men, in looking for whom Captain Gault and three other men lost their lives last Tuesday. They knew nothing about the disaster. Both men agreed in making this statement: On the 14th we started in a boat on a hunting trip with Walter Payne, hunter, from the schooner. While off Nestucca Payne said to pull for the shore. We refused Payne said that if we would not put him ashore he would lay us out. We were afraid that Payne would shoot us. He pointed his gun toward us, and we pulled in to the shore. Payne took the gun and ammunition with him, and said: "Now you go your way, and I will go mine." We asked him what he wanted to leave the schooner for. He said he had done something on the vessel he would not want his mother to know. We started for Nestucca, where we found the Harrison. Payne started across the mountains, and is now at Sheridan-Astorian.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

A SUFFICIENT GUARANTEE HAS BEEN RAISED.

Tillamook will be Lighted by Electricity Within three Months.
The electric light scheme is almost an assured thing, as nearly enough have signed to insure the putting in of the plant. The Tillamook Lumbering Co. agrees to put in a first-class plant, and keep the lights going all night, at a rate per month of \$1 per light of 16-candle power, for the first two years, and guarantee the lights to be a success. The streets of the city will have a suitable number of lights. As the Lumbering Co. need lights during night runs, and have their own power, they can put in a good plant at small cost, comparatively speaking, and are anxious to go right ahead and push the work to completion. Everyone should give the enterprise liberal support.

LATER:—A sufficient guarantee has been raised, and the plant will be started as soon as a member of the firm can go to Portland and close the negotiations for the machinery and equipments.
