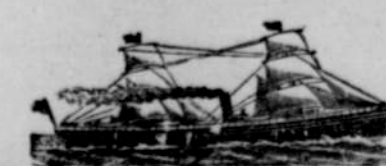

THE POLES UP.

GREAT REJOICING AMONG OUR
PEOPLE.The Electric Lights will Soon be in
Operation.Tillamook is in the Swim and has a
Glorious Future!

The Str. Augusta is en route with
the electric light plant purchased by the
Tillamook Lumbering Company. The
plant is a good one, the latest improved,
and has capacity to light a city of 5,000
inhabitants. Dynamos for both are and
incandescent lights are part of the plant.
The total lighting capacity for the are
lights will be 24,000 candle power and of
the incandescent, 9,600 candle power.
The streets will be lighted at first with
six are lights of 2,000 candle power each,
and the incandescent lights will be
placed in the business and dwelling
houses. Many who have not agreed to
take lights will take them, now, and as
the city is growing so rapidly, it was
thought to be economy to get a more ef-
fective plant at once, and so the com-
pany have secured another and larger
dynamo than the one originally ordered.
The sawed poles, which are already put
up, are neat, substantial ones, and they
give the city a metropolitan appearance.
Looking down First Street, or 3rd Ave. E,
the view is very imposing, for over a
quarter of a mile in each direction. One
are light will be placed at the corner by
the HEADLIGHT office, one at King's cor-
ner, one at the Occidental, one at Cohn's
corner, and at Chatterton's corner and one
at S. A. Roberts' corner. The lights
will be suspended in the middle of the
streets over the crossings. The HEADLIGHT
office will be brilliantly
lighted throughout with incandescent
lights, and so will nearly every business
house in the city. Mr. Lambirth, the
Electrician of the Thompson-Houston
Electric Co., of Portland, is here pushing
the construction, and within thirty days,
or less time, the city will be illuminated,
and there is no doubt the system will be
