POLITICAL OUTLOOK.

Republicans are looking forward to the primaries Saturday, and the convention a week later on, with considerable interest, and though there is no particular excitement, some of the candidates are getting a little anxious.

There is little probability of a fight in the Republican ranks, as the general disposition is to nominate men who have not been identified with factional fights, and the candidates who have offered themselves, so far, are not generally considered obnoxious to any faction. The general feeling is to let the candidates go before the convention and let the best man win. Candidates are quite numerous, and more to hear from, though the rivalry between them is good natured in every respect. The main interest centers on the Clerkship. L. H. BROWN says emphatically that he is not and will not be a candidate, and that his business interests fully occupy his time. It is rumored that Geo. L. Smith will be a candidate. Next in importance is the Sheriff's office, and candidates for this office are looming up all around. Lee Alley of Nehalem is the last to appear, and his name is favorably mentioned and his claims will be strongly pressed by the north end of the county. W. E. Baxter of Dolph says he will not be a candidate for School Superintendent.

There is little said in regard to some of the offices to be filled, and it is altogether likely that a majority of the delegates to the convention will come without having their minds made up regarding anyone in particular.

The Democrats are beginning to rustle around, though they have little hope of success, unless there should be a split again in the Republican ranks. At all events, the people are not likely to see another mud-slinging campaign, as all concerned are sick of it, and can now plainly see where the interests of all were injured. There is an atmosphere of improvement and enterprise in the town that is causing more excitement than anything else, and it is likely to overshadow political matters, and a quiet and fair local campaign will be conducive to the best business and financial interests of the county and city.

Republican Convention.

A Republican convention for the county of Tillamook will be held in Tillamook City, on Saturday, the 25th day of March at 10 o'clock, A. M., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the office of county clerk, sheriff, treasurer, commissioner, assessor, school superintendent, surveyor, coroner, and to choose four delegates to the state convention, and to transact such business as may properly come before the convention.

Don't Take Offense at This.

Many people who go into a printing office never think anything wrong in going into the typographical department or into the press room and making them selves at home, when the business office in front is always supplied with chairs for visitors or those who come to do business. The editor feels some delicacy about telling you that the proper place for business is in front, but it is sometimes necessary. It is always a great annoyance to the types to have parties talking to them, causes them to lose time and make errors, and no matter how careful you are, you are sure to be in the way of the printers who have to walk clear around the room, frequently, in order to pass someone who occupies the passage-way. Also the editor is liable, at any time, to use his chair behind his desk, and it is not the proper place for loafers. Besides, no one has a right to read the copy at the cases, nor to read the proofs or printed sheets until they are given to the public. There is often legal printing and other job-work of a private or confidential character, that is entrusted to the printer, and it is not just or in good taste for anyone to come in and inspect it, no more than to read private correspondence, which some people are so thoughtless as to do. No matter how small you are, how good natured you are, or even if you are an intimate friend, you can't go into the mechanical department of a printing office without greatly bothering and inconveniencing the printers. Of course, visitors are welcome in a printing office, and, on request, will always be courteously shown over the office by the editor, and as the business office is always supplied with maps, directories, dictionaries, cyclopedias, and other books, newspapers, stationery for writing, and is a place where general information is freely given to all, it is the proper place to do the loafing in.
